WHEAT SCORES COME-BACK ON CHICAGO MART

CHICAGO, May 29, (AP)—Wheat scored substantial gains in price here early today, helped by an unexpected upturn in wheat quotations at Liverpool. Sellers of wheat in Chicago were much less numerous than of late, and the market readily advanced with aggressive buying in evidence, largely from commission house sources. Opening at a shade decline to 1-8 gals, Chicago wheat later rose all around. Corn, oats and provisions developed strength too, with corn starting 1-8 off to 5-8 up, and subsequently showing a general advance.

WORLD MUST HAVE PEACE, OR PERISH

MORGANTOWN, W. Va., May 29.—Civilization, to exist, must have peace, according to Prof. Harold C. Havighurst, of the College of Law at West Virginia University. "Unless the nations of the world find some means of living together peaceably civilization will be imperiled," he said in a recent convocation address. "Peace may be brought about in three ways: by seeking an agreement for the limitation of armies; by making agreements of arbitration not to resort to war; by establishing machinery for the handling of international affairs."
