MEDFORD, Ore., May 30. (A.P.)—At meetings of the chamber of commerce and the Fruit Growers' league here Tuesday, resolutions were adopted asking that the state horticultural board inspect all shipments of fruit and vegetables entering Oregon from Florida as a curb against the Mediterranean fruit fly pest. Late action was requested in addition to the federal inspection law in force.

BARCLAY GETS LONG SENTENCE

PORTLAND, May 30 (AP)—Liquor law violation cases figured prominently in federal court Wednesday. William Barclay, Klamath Indian, was sentenced to one year and a day at McNeil Island and was fined \$100 when he pleaded guilty to violating the Jones liquor law by transporting and possessing one gallon of liquor on the reservation last May 1. The United States attorney told the court Barclay has a long record. He was sent to McNeil Island in 1909 for manslaughter, the attorney said, for having killed a tribesman, and was released in 1915. Liquor also figured in that record.

Sam Sugura, who with two other men, was indicted on a charge of violating the Jones liquor law, was acquitted by a federal court jury late yesterday. Where there's a will there's a court contest.

MOB LYNCHES JAILED NEGRO

Body of Man Who Attacked White Woman Hung to Tree

ALAMO, Tenn., May 29. (UP) The flaming passions of a mob which lynched the negro attacker of a white woman here today had cooled tonight, while Mrs. Johnnie James, 40, cried out in delirium at Trenton hosp. The negro, Joe Boxley, 18, was taken from jail by about 90 men half an hour after he had been brought here from the Carter county jail at Trenton for safe keeping. Boxley was arrested yesterday after an attack on Mrs. James, the wife of a Crockett county magistrate, near Trenton. She was found two hours later by the stepmother of the negro, and taken to a hospital. Her condition is reported to be critical. Shortly before dawn this morning, Sheriff E. C. Emerson of Crockett county saw the mob of 500 coming and dashed into his home. He hid the keys to the jail. The mob stormed Emerson's home and found the keys. Boxley was taken from the jail. He offered no resistance, and readily confessed to the outrage. Emerson attempted to disengage the mob from going through with the lynching. No attention was paid him. A rope was placed around the negro's neck. He remained calm, appearing not to be even frightened. Boxley was placed in an automobile and the mob drove out of town. The body was cut down from the limb of a tree five miles east of here several hours later. A placard hung on the body bore the words: "Let this hang here until 4 p.m. Thursday."

NEW BUS LINE SOUTH TO RENO OPENS SERVICE

Transportation Facilities Improved Between Three Cities

ALTURAS, Calif., May 30.—New transportation facilities from Alturas to Reno and Klamath Falls were provided here this week with the inauguration of a motor coach bus system between the Nevada and Oregon terminals by way of Susanville and Alturas. The new line is known as the O. C. and N. stages and they will be operated on regular schedule with 16 passenger motor coaches in each direction. The company is operated by W. M. Sanford of Sacramento and Frank G. Word of Reno, who now operate lines from Reno to Layton and Calpine. Sanford and Word were here Tuesday, the day on which the operation of the line was begun, and personally supervised the installation of the schedules. The north bound stages will leave Reno at 7:15 o'clock in the morning, arriving at Susanville at 10 o'clock and leaving for Alturas 10 minutes later. This stage will arrive here at 2:45 o'clock p. m. and will leave at 3 o'clock for Klamath Falls where it will arrive at 7:30 o'clock, making connections with trains for Portland and Seattle and with buses the following morning for Medford and points north. The buses south bound will depart from Klamath Falls at 8:15 a. m. and arrive here at 12:45 p. m., leaving for Susanville at 1:15 where they will arrive at 5:35 and leave 10 minutes later for Reno. The arrival time at that terminal is 8:30 o'clock. Connections will be made there for trains for Sacramento and San Francisco and with motor buses leaving in both directions.

The reports said Gulham was tortured to death.
