

MEMORIAL DAY IS MARKED IN U. S. CAPITAL

President Hoover Central
Figure in Patriotic
Pageant Today

WASHINGTON, May 30. (AP)—The capital today was the center of the nation's observance of Memorial Day, with President Hoover the central figure of the patriotic pageant arranged to express its gratitude to those who have offered their lives in defense of its honor and existence. The hush of the reverent tribute lay over the city and its historic cemeteries with governmental activity stilled and congress in adjournment for the occasion. Many members of congress were away to speak at services in other places.

The President chose the occasion to deliver his second address since he took office, the day and its significance turning his thoughts toward world peace and foreign affairs. The amphitheatre of the Arlington National cemetery, where the tomb of the Unknown Soldier is enshrined, was the setting for his participation in the national tribute.

Joining with hundreds of other citizens in the desire to pay personal tribute to the nation's war dead at that symbolic tomb, President and Mrs. Hoover both had prepared their gifts of memory to lay on the marble slab—the president's a wreath and Mrs. Hoover's a single rose.

The annual parade of veterans of the civil, Spanish-American, Indian and World wars, with the representatives of patriotic societies, and their pilgrimage to the cemetery were arranged to precede the president's address, which was timed to begin shortly after 1 o'clock, and the accompanying services.

Patriotic services also were arranged by various groups in Arlington and other cemeteries of the capital.

Although the weather bureau was unable to promise relief from the unseasonable heat of the last few days and indicated the possibility of showers, none of the plans for outdoor exercises were changed.

RICH DEPOSIT IS DISCOVERED

WASHINGTON, May 30. (AP)—Discovery of a rich mineral deposit of helium, development of which is expected to stimulate greatly the use of lighter-than-air craft in this country, was announced here today by representatives of the Helium company, of Louisville, Ky.

The new deposit was discovered by Lieutenant R. R. Bottoms, naval reserve officer and chief chemist of the Helium firm, in the Siltad helium area near Government Helium Reserve No. 1, in Colorado. The helium bearing gas was present over an area of 15,000 acres, Lieutenant Bottoms reported, and he believed the quantity was sufficient to give the United States undisputed world leadership in lighter-than-air development.

Lieutenant Bottoms said the Siltad gas assays 7.07 per cent helium content. The highest previous content known was 3.6 per cent in the assay of the helium deposit discovered two months ago by the Helium company near its plant in the Utah mountains.

The Helium company holds a contract for production of helium for the army and navy. Company officials indicated that production might be started at once in the new field, and that the firm's Utah plant might be shut down, leaving that deposit as a reserve for future emergencies.

EAST CASCADE ROUTE FAVORED BY TEX RANKIN

Noted Flyer Gives Views
on Air Transport
Line

ALTURAS, Calif., May 30.—That the air route between Reno and Portland by way of Alturas is one of the best and most feasible in the country is the opinion of Tex Rankin, veteran Pacific coast pilot, following a trip which he made between these points recently.

Rankin came through here about three weeks ago and following the hop he compared the flying conditions in this vicinity with those of the coastal region where he says the fog conditions are "very nasty."

A good route which Rankin selects to avoid these conditions is one from Portland, via The Dalles, Bend, Klamath Falls, Alturas, Reno, Yerington, Las Vegas and Kingman to Phoenix, or from Reno by way of Mono Lake and Owens valley to Los Angeles. Either of these routes connects with transcontinental lines.

Rankin further confirms the opinion of officials of the Yellowstone Cut-off Airways association by saying that the logical route from San Francisco to any part of the inland empire is by way of Redding and Alturas to Bend, Baker City, Spokane and Boise.

It is with the idea of exploiting the route between Redding and Boise that the association will stage a race between these points on July 7.

In this connection Rankin says, "This particular route offers the least hazards of any route north from San Francisco, and I feel certain that within the next five years you will see a great deal of air traffic through your district."
