RENE LA COSTE CONQUERS BILL TILDEN TODAY

Victory Assures All-French Title for Singles

ROLAND GARROS STADIUM, PARIS, June 1, (AP)—Rene La Coste conquered Bill Tilden today in one of the greatest of their series of Franco-American tennis battles, winning their semi-final round duel in the French championships, 6-1, 6-0, 5-7, 6-3.

La Coste's victory assured an all-French final for the singles title as Frank Hunter, Tilden's tennis comrade, was eliminated previously by Jean Borotra.

Big Bill, who always gives his followers a real run for their money, thrilled the thousands in the stands by a miraculous rally in the third set. La Coste had outplayed him by a wide margin in smashing through the first two sets and had gained a lead of 5-3 in the third when Tilden flashed four games of the tennis that made him a champion of champions five or six years ago to run out the set.

It took too much out of him, however, and even with the help of the ten minute rest period which followed he was no match for La Coste in the fourth set which went to the Frenchman with loss of but three games.

HELEN DEFEATS ENGLISH STAR

Eileen Bennett Puts Up Strenuous Battle in Second Set

ROLAND GARROS STADIUM, PARIS, June 1, (AP)—Helen Wills today entered the final round of the French tennis championships, in which she is defending her woman's singles crown, defeating Miss Eileen Bennett, English star, in the semi-finals of 6-2, 7-5.

Due partly to a close line decision in her favor which caused her deliberately to throw away two points, the American queen of the courts had a fairly narrow escape from losing a set for the first time since the English championships of 1927. Although there never was any question of Miss Wills' ultimate victory, the English player achieved the rare feat of forcing a set to deuce against the champion of three nations when she made a courageous bid for the second set.

Jean Borotra, one of France's famous "three musketeers" of the tennis court, eliminated Francis T. Hunter in the quarter finals of the French tennis championships today, 6-8, 10-8, 4-6, 8-6, 6-1.
