FIGHTING "BOB" AGAIN SUED ON LIBEL CHARGE

LOS ANGELES, June 1, (UP)—Radio speeches of the Rev. R. P. "Bob" Shuler, pastor of Trinity Methodist Episcopal church and politician, involved him in his fourth libel action in three months when he was sued for \$100,000 today.

Wilbur C. Curtis, candidate for municipal judge, asked the damages. According to the complaint, Shuler broadcast that the election of Curtis would be a public calamity, asserted that he was too young and inexperienced and advised him to "see me in three years if he still wants to be judge."

Shuler's "a civil libel action brought by Deputy Sheriff Amos R. Jones, whom the pastor assertedly accused of giving a prisoner a gun and killing him when he tried to escape, and a criminal libel brought by Mayor George Cryer, whom asserted "sudden wealth" he questioned. Shuler recently was acquitted of libelling the Knights of Columbus.
