

VOLCANO POURS OUT RIVER OF RED HOT LAVA

CORDOVA, Alaska, June 3. (AP)—Intermittently lighting the sky with flames and darkening it with ashes a new volcano today was pouring molten lava down the sides of an unnamed mountain and threatening to cover all of Akutan Island, residents of the upper Aleutian islands reported here.

The island, 1,000 miles southwest of Cordova, normally would have about a dozen residents at this time of year. Their fate was unknown here. If they escaped the first outbreak of the volcano which blew off the top of the mountain, they presumably fled to some neighboring island of the Aleutian chain.

Heavy ash from the volcano was gradually covering neighboring islands, observers reported, and blanketing vegetation with a coat of grey. Volcanic ash has been seen here but whether this was from the Akutan eruption or from some unreported disturbance in turbulent islands of the Bering sea was unknown.

COOKS FIND NEW VALUE OF SUGAR

Vegetables More Delicious When Cooked New Way

Two groups of women, all famous cooking experts, recently conducted a series of tests to find the most tasteful way of preparing vegetable dishes. In every case, after the various ways of cooking vegetables were tried, the experts unanimously voted in favor of using only a little water and adding sugar in cooking vegetables.

One group of experts recommends this unusual recipe for baked apples and onions. Slice 3 medium-size apples and six medium-size onions into a greased casserole in alternate layers, seasoning with salt, pepper, 1/2 cup of sugar, and 2 tablespoons butter. Add 1/4 cup water and bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) about 1/2 of an hour.

The sugar adds not only to the taste but also to the food and energy value of the vegetables, so that they are not only valuable vitamin foods, but foods that furnish working power to the individual. Use a liberal dash of sugar, depending on the quantity cooked, with peas, lima beans, string beans, corn, carrots, beets, parsnips, sweet potatoes, squash, onions and tomatoes. 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F. Loosley Lives In Same House In Three Counties

FORT KLAMATH, June 1. (Special)—Having been a resident of Wood River valley for over 50 years, during which time he has been a citizen in three different counties while living in the same house, has been the experience of Fred Loosley, a prominent rancher of this district.

Mr. Loosley came to Klamath valley in 1870 with his father, John Loosley, who was employed in the Indian service. At the time old Fort Klamath was still in its heyday of soldier life. With the officers, ladies and enlisted men present, the garrison was the center of trade and social activities.

As a boy, the Wood River man heard the sunrise gun as the noise of its loud report rolled away across the plains at 6 a. m. He heard the bugle blasts as the shrill notes hastened the young fellows in blue to roll call, and Mr. Loosley also witnessed stirring actions about the old citadel during those tense days of the Modoc war.

Mr. Loosley is above the average layman historian. He recalls names and dates. He remembers old Capt. James Jackson, the fort commandant and other men prominent in the Modoc trouble of 1872 and 1873.

According to Mr. Loosley, the Wood River valley was embraced in Jackson county at first, then formed part of Lake county, and finally was included as a part of Klamath county in 1883.
