

# Purdue Drawn Into Big Ten Controversy Over Subsidizing Athletes

## CHARGES MADE BY BASKETBALL MENTOR TODAY

### Serious Accusations Preferred by Coach of Indiana High School

CHICAGO, June 5.—(AP) The big ten athletic turmoil grew today as Everett Case, basketball coach of Frankfort, Ind., High school, advised he was prepared to go before commissioner John L. Griffith with proof that Purdue, as well as Iowa, was guilty of subsidizing athletes.

Coach Case said he also would prove to commissioner Griffith that Purdue revealed his credit mixup with Iowa because he refused to recruit for Word "Peggy" Lambert, Boilermaker basketball coach.

Charges, presumably coming from Purdue, were made recently that Case had sent two of his star basketball players, Doyal Plunkett and Bob Spradling, to Iowa in exchange for free teaching credits.

Nelson Kellog, Purdue director of athletics advised the Associated press over long distance telephone, that he would be glad to have Case outline his charges.

"We are anxious to know if any one connected with Purdue is guilty of proselytizing or subsidizing athletes," Kellog said, "and if Case has such information, now is the time to give it to commissioner Griffith, but as far as I know there is no basis for such charges."

## HIGHER LIMIT ON GAME FISH CLAIMED NEED

Date for the annual fish fry of the Klamath Sportsman's association was set for June 24 at a meeting of the group Monday evening at the chamber of commerce offices.

The club discussed the possibility of raising the limit of fish on Diamond lake. At the present time five is the limit. The rule was made when the fish were larger and now the fish are smaller. The club also favored the raising of the locks at the lake in order that the fish may go up the streams to spawn. It will favor the raising of the locks four hours every week.

## Named Kansas Cities After Brown Players



In the old major league of twelve cities, Charley Comiskey, owner of the Chicago White Sox, was captain and first baseman of the old St. Louis Browns, who won pennants in 1885, 1888, 1887 and 1888.

I am indebted to my old friend Harry Alm, who told me how the names of that gallant old crowd of athletes has been perpetuated.

It seems that in 1886, the Missouri Pacific men built the Central Kansas line, from Oswatimie to Scott City. Being ardent fans they named each new town along the right of way after a ball player on the St. Louis team. In that way every player on the roster has his name perpetuated by the name of a Kansas town.

My enthusiastic informant says he had occasion to stop off at Comiskey, Kansas, and found it boasted of a population of 50 people, none of them knowing the origin of the name of the town.

All the famous old players are represented, including Comiskey, Swayne, Carlton, Smolan, Falan, Lansley, Crawford, Bushon, Boyd, Shields, Healy, McCracken, Brownell and the rest of that immortal gang.

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## 33 TO 1 SHOT DERBY WINNER

### Millions Change Hands As Outside Wins Famous Race

EPSON DOWNS, England, June 5, (AP)—W. Barnett's Trigo, an outsider at 33 to 1, ran away from a picked field of 25 rivals to win the 149th running of the famous English derby here today.

Before an immense crowd estimated by one official at "nearly a million," this comparatively obscure son of Blandford and Athast romped home a winner by one and one-half lengths.

As the game colt tore down the slope of the straightway to register one of the many upsets recorded in the long history of this famous classic, literally millions of dollars changed hands throughout the entire world where wagering and participation in the mammoth sweepstakes is believed to have totalled nearly \$100,000,000.

In that final rush for the finish which is accentuated in the derby by a downhill sweep in the famous track, thousands of eyes searched in vain among the leaders for such popular favorites as Cragadous, Mr. Jinks and Hunter's Moon.

Of the three show horses, Walter Gay, which finished second, was the best liked in the pre-race speculation. Brezins which came home third, two lengths farther back, was held at the extremely long odds of 50 to 1.

Walter Gay had been one of the heaviest-tipped horses in the event for the last few days and his fine showing was well received. There had been some doubt before the race as to whether he would start as his popular owner, Lord Woolavington, had warning that the hard ground might keep him out of the field.

Kopl, which was one of the most heavily backed entries, had the misfortune to fall near the hazardous "Tattenham Corner," his jockey, F. N. Winter escaped injury.

The judges placed Lord Derby's Hunter's Moon fourth and W. M. G. Singer's Engarde fifth.

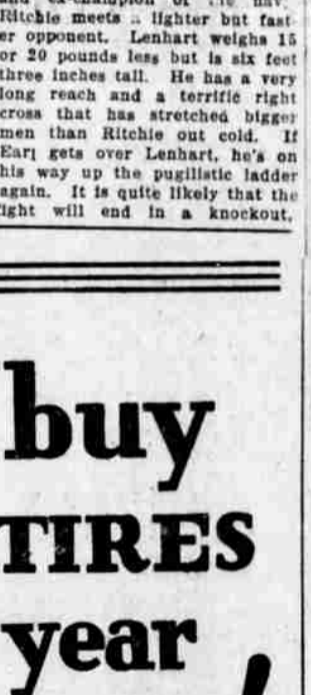
## HORSE THROWS PRINCE HENRY
