ACCUSATION OF KILLING DENIED

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triangle, her husband, Frank D. Patti, Portland business man, and William Tallman, former radio operator.

The latter is under arrest on board the steamer Admiral Benson, due in San Francisco tonight from San Pedro.

Mrs. Patti's body was found yesterday morning, in the closet of a rooming house on Union street, tied to a clothes hook, and bearing numerous bruises and contusions, showing beyond doubt that she had met death by violence. Just how long her body had been in the closet, police were unable to definitely determine, but Coroner Frank Nance approximated the time as between 24 and 72 hours after death.

Meanwhile under telegraphic instructions to San Francisco police, Tallman will be turned over to Los Angeles detectives and brought to this city to face formal complaint of murder, on arrival of the Admiral Benson in the bay city, late today.

Tallman was arrested on instruction of local police to the captain of the Admiral Benson within 12 hours after discovery of Mrs. Patti's body. When informed of his arrest, Tallman, according to the captain of the steamer, "seemed stunned" and claimed innocence of the slaying.

Suspicion was directed toward Tallman by Patti, who told police he had learned that the radio operator had been paying marked attention to his wife during his absence. The Patti's have been winter residents of Los Angeles for some time, due, Patti explained, to his wife's health. She had he said, also spent some time in Arizona, because of fear of tubercular affliction. On another side of the triangle police said the room where Mrs. Patti's body was discovered, had been rented a few days before by a man giving the name of "W. C. Johnson of San Francisco." The owner of the rooming house, Mrs. M. W. Wilson, when shown a picture of Tallman, identified it as Johnson, police said.

Police found in their running down of numerous lines of information that Mrs. Patti had been married previously. Her first husband, Arthur J. Wisnagel, now resides in Los Angeles, with a daughter of this union, Helen Dorothy, 8 years old. Mrs. Patti was 28 years of age.

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slogan competition is open only to high school students and the sponsors have such high hopes that it will produce six or fewer words that will ring from Maine to California that the winner will receive a free trip to Washington and return with a companion. "See America First."

The competition judges are Ivy Lee, Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, John Price Jones, Mrs. James J. Storrow and Mrs. Harry Arkness Fagler. They will consider all the slogans of six words or less.

In announcing the contest the Art Center has been almost too cautious. It merely gives one hint—that it considers "See America first" an excellent slogan and that competitors will do well to think up contributions along such model.

For instance, the student may merely make it "See America First—Between the Billboards."

Other slogans spring to mind, but unfortunately they are perhaps too frivolous to be considered in a competition which is destined to end up on the White House steps.

The president is unlikely to hand over a certificate with "Reach for a hot dog instead of a wild flower" engraved on it. "Not a razor blade in a canyon" also would be too long. "Don't dump used car here" lacks grace. "Keep the peanuts off Pike's Peak" is too localized. So is "See Roosevelt—the dam what am."

But "save the scenery and you save all" might have a chance if some high school student of journalism can pry out that extra word.

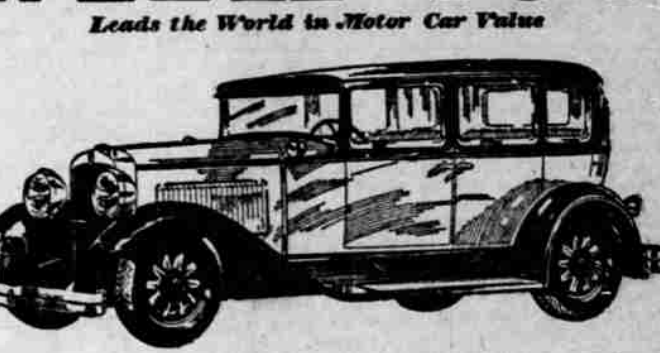
