Payroll In Dorris Said Million, Start Buildings

DORRIS, Calif., June 5. (Special)—With its million dollar annual payroll, this city is regarded as one of the most progressive of its size in the north-west of the state. Among the major industrial plants with a large disbursement of funds to employees is the Kesterson Lumber company, with its sawmill and logging operation pays out half a million dollars annually.

The Associated Lumber and Box company distributes a quarter million dollars to its crews every twelve months, while the Dorris Lumber and Moulding Co. spends around \$25,000 in salary overhead each year.

Dorris is increasing in population, and both business blocks and residences are going up. Two brick-cement structures are in process of erection. One is 25 by 85 feet in size and will be occupied by a link of the Mac-Marr chain stores. It is being erected by Tabor and Wise.

The second building identical in size is being completed for Glen May, who will use it for a drug store. Both buildings are located on Main street.

New improvements and additions will be under way on the high school, while a large number of new residences are in process of construction.

LEGION FAVORS PROPERTY BID OF O. C. E. LINE

Votes to Support Offer of \$73,000 and Seventh Street Land

After Mayor T. B. Watters had explained the offers made to the city for the purchase of the O. C. and E. bonds at a meeting of the American Legion last night the Legion voted to favor the sale of the bonds and to favor the acceptance of \$73,000 in cash and property appraised by the realty commission at \$143,000.

Following a talk by Mayor Watters, Bert Igl made a motion that the Legion go on record favoring the cash and property offer for the bonds. Discussion was then heard and the motion carried.

It was brought out in the discussion that the city could accept the property, approximately six blocks, lying between Klamath and Commercial avenues and between Seventh and Eighth streets, could save enough property for a park and playground for children and for an armory site, and could sell the remainder. This was the plan favored by the Legion.

The city, the Legion claims, could turn in the value of the armory site as part of the one-quarter, which it will have to provide if an armory is constructed here. The county will have to provide a quarter of the total amount and the state would furnish the remaining half.

The O. C. & E. bonds, \$300,000, purchased about 12 years ago, will be voted on at an election on June 25. The people will vote on whether or not to sell the bonds, and will vote if they wish to sell them or whether or not they wish \$150,000 in cash, or \$75,000 and the O. C. & E. property as described above.

The Legion also heard the report of the committee in charge of the National Indian Congress and Fourth of July celebration committee.

WORK RESIGNS FROM POSITION AS G. O. P. HEAD

WASHINGTON, June 5. (UP)—Dr. Hubert Work, chairman since last year of the republican committee, resigned today a few hours after a conference with President Hoover at the White House. His resignation will be accepted formally and a successor chosen at a meeting of the national committee early in the fall.

His retirement, following so quickly on the heels of that of Kael Walker, Wisconsin, thus removes from the public picture two of the outstanding figures of the Hoover campaign, and two who were the center of fire.

Work gave no reason for his resignation in his letter to the committee made public today, except to say that he had prepared his resignation for the committee meeting March 5, had been dissuaded from presenting it, and did
