Thoughts We've Been Thinking

Henry Ford Says Precisely What He Thinks. Need Legislation for Drunken Aviators As Well As Auto Drivers.

HENRY FORD has a habit of saying anything that he feels.

PRESERVER MISSING ON BIG VESSEL

Believe Young Radio Man Attempted to Swim Ashore

VESSEL IS SEARCHED BY S. F. OFFICERS

Guard Placed at Stage and Train Depots to Check William Tallman If He Succeeded in Swimming to Shore From Boat Where He Was Held Captive.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 6, (AP)—Discovery that a life preserver was missing on the steamer Admiral Benson from which William L. Tallman, suspected of slaying Mrs. Virginia Patty in Los Angeles, disappeared last night, led police to believe today that the young radio man may have swum ashore or perished in the attempt.

In spite of the clue, however, fifty police were searching the vessel at pier 20 on the theory that Tallman is still aboard, hidden in the cargo or engine room.

A third theory that the suspect may have been furnished with a woman's clothing by an accomplice and walked ashore when the vessel docked, led to a guard being placed at stage and train depot.

MELLON TELLS DRY PROBLEMS

WASHINGTON, June 6, (AP)—Secretary Mellon was the first high government official to present his views on America's crime and lawlessness problems today before President Hoover's national commission on law observance and enforcement.

Holding its second meeting, the commission called a number of government officials to present their views on the task of pursuing the nation wide investigation of law enforcement problems. The names of the other officials were not disclosed.

While the session was behind closed doors, Mr. Mellon was understood to have mainly presented his views on the enforcement of the prohibition and narcotic laws which come under the jurisdiction of the treasury department.

The commission also considered the formulation of its policies for the investigation and a program which probably will call for public hearings in various large cities of the country on crime and law enforcement conditions.

Dorris Made Up Of Many Business Enterprises

DORRIS, Calif., June 6, (Special)—Nearly every kind of business enterprise is represented in Dorris. The big weekly payroll here places all these commercial enterprises on a profit-making basis.

Three general stores are maintained here and are owned respectively by E. Werdermann, Bert Long and Harry H. Robinson. J. W. Stevenson is proprietor of a grocery store. The clothing business is in the hands of Charles C. Darnell, who also conducts a cleaning and pressing establishment.

There are two hotels here: The Lang, with Harry Mitchell as landlord and the Excelsior, Mrs. M. Silver, in charge.

The Dorris garage business is controlled by Tabor & Wise of the Ford agency and the Northern, presided over by Ivan Dennis.

A live, weekly newspaper is published at Dorris, called the Butte Valley Star. A. M. McDonald is the editor and he is ably assisted by Mrs. McDonald.

DYNAMITE TRENCH ON LINK RIVER

One of the most interesting construction jobs ever undertaken in Klamath is in progress on, or rather under, Link River.

The project is the river crossing of the main sewer conduit and is included in unit two of the \$300,000 trunk line sewer and sewage disposal system. The contract is held by the J. F. Shea Plumbing company of Portland.

The construction company is digging a trench along the bottom of the river from the east to the west side, just below Link river bridge. The pipe will terminate on the west side in a pumping plant which will pump sewage to the disposal plant near Mansey point.

The interesting feature of the under-water project is that the trench must be dynamited. Water proof casing is sunk to the river bed and a hole drilled in the rock. Dynamite is lowered through the casing, the hole is tamped and the dynamite exploded.

In this way, the construction company has been dynamiting a deep trench on the river bottom. When the pipe is placed, it will be covered with rock.

WORK ON LAKE ROAD STARTED

Work of clearing the Crater Lake Highway from both the west and south entrance was started today by a crew of workmen, according to word from Chief Ranger Godfrey.

The highway is clear to within three miles of Anna Springs, however the road is not reported in good condition at this time and Chief Ranger Godfrey is not advising motorists to make the trip.

"With crews busy clearing this highway with snow plows, entrance should be possible both on the west and south by the middle of June," Mr. Godfrey told the chamber of commerce today over long distance telephone.

TRANSFER OF BUREAU IS PLANNED

President Hoover Urges Session of Joint Committee to Study Question

BELIEVED FIRST OF BIG DRY OFFENSIVE

President Sends Message to Congress This Morning Asking for Early Action on Proposition of Transferring Prohibition Bureau to Department of Justice.

WASHINGTON, June 6, (AP)—President Hoover today recommended to congress the appointment of a joint select committee to study matters pertaining to the transfer of the prohibition unit from the treasury to the justice department, and other subjects in connection with the administration of the bureau having to do with dry law enforcement.

The chief executive informed congress in this, his second message to the special session, that he would appoint a committee from the departments to cooperate with the congressional committee and that the national commission on law observance and enforcement also would cooperate through their studies of the departmental organization.

The joint congressional committee, would be expected to formulate recommendations for the consideration of congress: at the regular session in December and at which the chief executive (Continued on Page Eight)

PEARSON TALKS TO KIWANIS

George Pearson, Bend, connected with the Brooks-Scanlon Lumber company, continued today his drive in Klamath for more loyalty and support of not only Klamath lumber industry but all lumber industry of the northwest. He addressed the Kiwanis club at their noon luncheon and, in plain words, told the civic club that the lumber industry needed the solid support of lumber producing communities.

Mr. Pearson pointed out that wooden containers should be used for merchandise containers and urged that the club members use their influence to prevail upon merchants to use wooden boxes. He told how an organization of mill workers in Bend had increased the use of wooden boxes in that city from 20 per cent to 80 per cent, and he urged that similar action be taken in Klamath Falls.

The lumber expert went on to describe the importance of the Oregon lumber industry to Oregon, Washington and Idaho. He said that 65 cents out of every payroll dollar in these three states comes from the lumber industry.

NOBLEMAN CAUGHT IN BOOZE RAID

Count De Maxence de Polignac Arrested by Dry Officers

IMPLICATED IN BIG NEW YORK RUM RING

Find Seven Cases of Liquor in Count's Suite in the Savoy-Plaza Hotel; Huge Liquor Business Uncovered in Gotham.

NEW YORK, June 6, (AP)—Count Francis De Maxence de Polignac, said to be of the old French nobility, was arrested by undercover prohibition agents today and charged with being the European agent of an international rum ring.

Seven cases of liquor were seized in the Count's suite at the Savoy-Plaza hotel.

The Count's arrest occurred in a general roundup of 37 men who are charged with conspiracy to violate the prohibition act in connection with the activities of the alleged ring.

William J. Calhoun, chief in charge of the 40 agents making the roundup, said a pile of papers relating to activities of the ring were found in Count De Polignac's suite.

Another raid conducted on the "headquarters" of the ring resulted in the arrest of two other alleged leaders, William Bartels and Philip D. Gowen.

Bartels and Gowen occupied offices at 209 Fifth avenue under the firm name of the "Gobart Co., Exporters and Importers." Two other men arrested in the offices were William B. Flynn and George Heath.

Meanwhile other agents entered a warehouse of J. M. Dooley and son, at 445 Twelfth street, Brooklyn, seized two truck loads of liquor, and arrested Dooley, his brother William, and William's two sons, John and James.

Chris Inteman, head of the Inteman Trucking company, alleged to be the concern which made the ring's deliveries, also was arrested.

John B. Holby, a warehouseman, and Samuel F. Horn, who conducted a "fur" store at 55 West 42nd street, in which no furs were found, were taken into custody.

Count De Polignac was scheduled to sail Friday on the French liner Paris, according to Calhoun. The count's planned departure led him to order the raids today.

The ring has been using warehouses to store its stock. Calhoun declared, and was fully organized with salesmen and delivery truckmen.

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SURVEY ON NEW LINE TO START

MEDFORD, Ore., June 6, (A. P.)—James H. The object of the survey, Owen said, is to determine if a route to Klamath county in a southeasterly direction is feasible, and to estimate costs.

Mr. Owen reiterated that the project is strictly an Owen-Oregon enterprise made necessary to furnish a speedy outlet for its own timber.

A topographical map of the section will be made. The plan to have pictures for this purpose taken by airplane was abandoned.

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TOWN SAVED BY LULL IN WIND

THE PAS, Man., June 6, (AP)—A sudden lull in the wind, combined with the battle of men against the roaring flames of a forest fire, has saved Cranberry Portage, picturesque mining town, 50 miles north of The Pas, from destruction.

Early today reports from Cranberry said the flames were being held in check after a struggle on the part of miners and prospectors, under the direction of forest rangers, but danger still threatened. The fire still was raging, and if a stiff wind again came up from the north-east the remaining buildings in the town would be endangered.

Tuesday, the fire, fanned into an inferno by a terrific north-east wind, swept into the new town site of Cranberry and within a few minutes had destroyed half a hundred business buildings and dwellings, and rendered 200 people homeless.

All day Wednesday it threatened the old site and only the fortunate lull of the wind and the mighty battle of the begrimed fighters kept the flames behind the fire guards hastily constructed.

COMPLAINTS ISSUED BY COMMISSION

Charge Misrepresentation in Sale of Western Yellow Pine

FIVE BASIN MILLS MADE DEFENDANTS

Federal Trade Commission Issues Complaints Against 46 Lumber Companies of California, Oregon, New Mexico, Arizona and Nevada for Sales Methods

WASHINGTON, June 6, (AP)—The federal trade commission has issued complaints against 46 lumber companies in California, Oregon, New Mexico, Arizona, and Nevada, charging misrepresentation in the sale of western yellow pine as white pine.

The companies include some of the largest lumber producers on the west coast. Hearings were set for July 5.

The lumber in question, the complaints declared, lacked many qualities of true white pine.

The design of the white pine was employed, the commission declared, to avoid market disadvantages from possible confusion in the minds of buyers of western yellow pine with southern yellow pine, a still different type.

This has resulted, it said, great confusion as to the relative qualities of the western yellow pine and white pine, which the commission added, was recognized as a superior building material.

The Oregon mills include the Lamm Lumber company of Modoc Point, the Chilquin Lumber company of Chilquin, the Forest Lumber company of Pine Ridge, the Alcoma Lumber company of Alcoma, the Braxmill White Pine Lumber company of Brax, and the Owen Oregon Lumber company, Medford.
