## ATHLETICS WIN WHILE PIRATES CLIMB TO LEAD

### Buccaners Slip Into First Without Playing Yesterday

After compiling a losing streak of one consecutive game, the Athletics returned to the winning column yesterday as their fellow Pennsylvanians, the Pirates, climbed into the National league lead without lifting a bat. The Buccaneers turned this trick by sitting idle in the rain while the Giants thumped the Cardinals by 6 to 4 at St. Louis.

The Athletics defeated the Browns by 5 to 2, and of course, gained a full game over the St. Louis contenders, who fell into third place. The Yankees worked arduously for twelve innings to defeat Cleveland by 6 to 5 at the Ruppert stadium.

The Mackinn victory gave Rube Walberg another opportunity to display his mastery over the St. Louisans, who collected only four hits off his delivery.

The pitching perfection which has marked recent games at the Yankee Stadium was missing yesterday when Waite Hoyt had to have the help of Fred Heimach to pull the hugmen through successfully. John Millis saved Joe Shaute from a bad situation in the seventh, but himself succumbed in the twelfth when two scratch singles, a pass and a sacrifice manufactured the winning run.

The Sox ran up the amazing total (for them) of 23 hits and 17 runs to defeat the White Sox by 17 to 3 at Fenway.

Washington continued its improvement by defeating Detroit, 5 to 2. Fred Marberry halted the famous Tiger attack with five hits.

## DERN FLATTENS ROBERT RUSE

PORTLAND, Ore., June 6. (A.P.)—Ira Dern, Salt Lake, heavyweight wrestler, took two out of three falls from Bob Kruse, Oswego, here last night. Dern won the first fall in 32 minutes, 41 seconds on a flying chancery. Kruse took the second fall in 5 minutes 9 seconds with a succession of standing wristlocks. Dern took the final fall in 2 minutes when he hoisted Kruse in the air, threw him over his shoulder, and smashed him to the mat. Dern weighed 195, F-use 196½.

In the preliminary Ray Jeffries, Portland, and Joe Reynolds, Los Angeles wrestled to a draw, each winning a fall.
