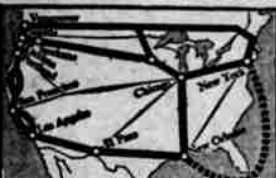

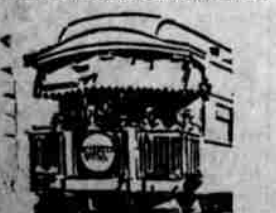

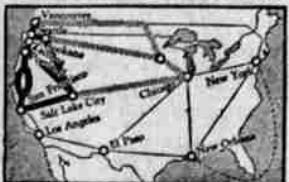

VETERANS FAVOR PROPERTY CASH BID OF O. C. E.

Join American Legion in Recommending Action to Electorate

Veterans of Foreign Wars joined the American Legion last night in recommending that the city electorate accept the cash-property bid of the O. C. & E. railroad for the city's \$300,000 interest in the line, instead of the straight offer of \$150,000.

T. R. Watters, mayor, appeared before the veterans and explained the two offers of the railroad company. One is \$73,000 and the seventh street property which is valued, according to the appraisal committee of the realty board, at \$143,000. The other bid is for \$150,000.

The Legion Tuesday night not only favored the property-cash bid, but recommended that sufficient of the seventh street property be retained by the city to provide for a playground, armory site and city park.

PLAN TO FILM RACE ON RIVER

the apartment of Mrs. Virginia Patten, slain wife of a Portland, Ore., investment broker, police today were pursuing a new line of investigation in the affairs of the comely 28 year old woman.

Mrs. Patten's battered body was discovered Tuesday morning in the closet of a rooming house, in a section of the city far removed from the exclusive district where she had maintained her residence.

William Tallman, Oakland radio operator, wanted in connection with the murder was missing when the steamer, Admiral Benson arrived at San Francisco last night.

The finding of narcotics in Mrs. Patten's apartment, seemed to the police to bear out an expressed suspicion of her husband, Frank Patten, that his wife had become addicted to the use of stimulants. He had previously told police of his wife's ill health, adding that they had resided in Los Angeles during several past winters on account of it. She had, Patten said, spent some time in Arizona for treatment of tubercular ailment, but Patten had understood, he said, that she had not suffered further symptoms, lately, and was apparently cured.

In their investigation of the rooming house apartment yesterday police tabulated the following new asserted evidence:

A man's brown, blood-spattered suit of clothes, bearing an Oakland trademark. The suit was found in a suit case, in which also was an Oakland newspaper dated May 18. Police said Tallman was known to have left Oakland May 19. Other articles of apparel, a razor, shaving brush and lotion were in the suitcase. Police said the shaving implements had yielded sharp specimens of fingerprints.

Chief of Detectives Herman Cline declared that the brown suit had been described by Mrs. Dora Scott, mother of the dead woman, as belonging to Tallman. She was well acquainted with Tallman, police said.

Senator Jones, of Washington, author of the nation's newest and most stringent dry law, said he would be glad to offer a resolution in the senate for appointment of the commission.

It was generally agreed at the capitol that legislation would be necessary to bring about such a transfer.

Some senators indicated they regarded the recommendation as the forerunner of a general reorganization of the prohibition service with a view to making a gigantic and determined, if undramatic attempt at enforcement of the law.
