

HEART BROKEN ACTRESS LEAPS TO HER DEATH

Unrequited Love Affair
Held Reason for
Suicide

CHICAGO, June 7, (UP)—Barbara Cole, actress in "Rose Marie" and Ziegfeld's "Blue Boy", leaped to her death from the twelfth floor apartment in a northside hotel Wednesday night.

A minute before she made the jump to the sidewalk below, she called the hotel telephone operator and said calmly:

"This is Miss Cole. I am going to jump from my window." She replaced the receiver, walked across the room, lifted the screen and dived out.

Abundant evidence that the suicide was planned carefully was found in her luxurious suite. No notes were found but indication of an unhappy love affair were discovered written on the fly leaf of a diary.

"I loved Ed Page, 1209 Astor street," a notation read. Edwin Page, Lasalle street broker, said he had known Miss Cole for some time but their romance had been broken off by a quarrel.

"She called me this afternoon," Page said, "and accused me of being cold and distant. She threatened to jump from her window but I thought it was an idle threat. I hung up the receiver."
