

GUARDSMEN TO TRAIN IN JULY

Encampment at Camp Clatsop Arranged by General White

SALEM, Ore., June 7. (AP)—About 2500 troops of the Oregon National Guard will be in training at Camp Clatsop July 12 to 26 inclusive. The movement of troops from various parts of the state to the training camp is shown in detail in general orders issued from the office of Brigadier General George A. White, commander of the Oregon troops.

The seven troop trains will converge at Portland, leaving there July 12 and arriving at Camp Clatsop the same day. Train commanders will be Colonel Hiram U. Welch, Colonel Eugene Mosher, Lieutenant Colonel Fred M. West, Major Ralph R. Haron, Major Ralph P. Cowgill, Major Edward H. Hamilton, and Major James C. Shiley.

UTAH SHIPPERS FOR NEW LINE

SALT LAKE CITY, June 7. (AP)—The Utah Shippers Traffic association today informed the interstate commerce commission of its advocacy of the application of the Great Northern and Western Pacific railroads for permission to connect their lines between Klamath Falls, Oregon, to Keddle, California.

The association asked permission to be heard in behalf of the application if the commission holds hearings.

REPARATIONS REPORT SIGNED

It recommends annuities of 1,700,000,000 gold marks (approximately \$400,000,000) for the last 22 years subject to the profits of the international bank to be created under the reparations agreement and an arrangement for amortization in which the creditor powers will participate.

ELKINS, W. Va., June 7. (AP)—"Don't be a snob. Don't try to marry the boss' daughter. God bless you if you are lucky enough to marry his stenographer."

Dr. Copeland deviated from his address to comment on the advice of Robert Emmens Rogers, associate professor of English of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, last week. Professor Rogers told the seniors of M. I. T.:

"I care not what particular calling you may follow," Dr. Copeland said, "you will not live up to your responsibilities as an American unless you have a part in all those things having to do with the common welfare. There is nothing nobler than to be a citizen of this great republic."

Model Prisoner.

Placed under guard by Captain M. A. Hohl of the Admiral Benson upon the strength of a radio warrant from Los Angeles authorities, Tallman apparently was a model prisoner and willing to face whatever formal charge might be made against him.

When the Admiral Benson docked at this city, Captain Hohl, his face gleaming with pride and the key to Tallman's room held confidently in his hand, led local detectives and those from Los Angeles to their "prisoner."

GOON.

The good captain placed the key in the lock—but something was wrong. It would not work. In disgust he pushed against the door and it opened to disclose an empty room.

Tallman had unscrewed part of the lock on the inside of the room; had slipped past the crewman standing guard in front of the door and had completely disappeared.

Theories concerning his whereabouts or his fate have been many and varied but none has produced results. It is thought that he may have jumped overboard and swam ashore; that he may have taken his life in the Pacific; that he may still be hiding aboard ship.

Farwell Note?

A few scraps of paper which, when placed together, indicated they may have formed a "farewell" note from the missing man to his father, were found in a wastebasket in his room. Their authenticity was questionable.

Those familiar with the unwritten "law of the sea" hold an interesting theory regarding Tallman's disappearance. They say that a "salvor never" deserts another sailor.

Tallman at one time was radio operator aboard the Admiral Benson. It is thought that perhaps some of his former crew mates may be hiding him aboard the vessel, unwilling even to desert a "pal" suspected of murdering a woman.

Conduct Search.

Lieutenant Frank Condafer of the Los Angeles police department who with Detective Sergeant Michael Desmond sailed aboard the Admiral Benson last night when the vessel left for Portland, Ore., said:

"We have learned that a man might possibly hide aboard a ship the size of the Admiral Benson—if he had friends aiding him—for as long a time as three or four months."

Condafer and Desmond plan to continue search of the vessel, confident that if Tallman is aboard they will eventually discover his whereabouts.

Probably never in the history of the Pacific coast has such a prominent criminal case stood virtually at a standstill for such a length of time.

Beaten With Brick.

The body of Mrs. Patty, wife of a Portland, Ore., financier and only 25 years of age, was found hanging by a scarf in a clothes closet in a Los Angeles apartment last Monday. She had been beaten with a brick.

Notes found in her apartment indicated Tallman and Mrs. Patty had been close friends. His actions were traced and it was discovered he had sailed from San Diego for San Francisco.

SHE JUMPED BUT WHY, OFFICERS ASK

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 7. (AP)—"Open the door," said the detectives, "in the name of the law."

A woman's voice answered this summons last night, saying: "Just a minute until I change my clothes."

The minute became ten, and the detectives went in. The woman, Mrs. Ethel Brown, 26, had jumped from the two story window and was severely injured.

The detectives wonder why she jumped. She wasn't the one they were looking for.

Chief James Lyon, who announced the veteran investigator's suspension last night, said Bean had been in possession of Tallman's name and description and had been informed of his whereabouts four hours before the suspect sailed from San Pedro, Calif., aboard the steamer Admiral Benson last Tuesday afternoon.

Tallman escaped from the ship before it docked at San Francisco.

Captain of Detectives Al Slatten, who took over direction of the investigation, succeeding Bean, announced additional clues which he said pointed to Tallman as the slayer. These included signature—"W. L. Tallman," and "W. C. Johnson"—on the register at Tallman's hotel, and at the rooming house in which Mrs. Patty's body was found, with head battered, trussed to clothes hooks in a closet behind a folding bed.

Comparison of the signatures showed sufficient similarity in cursive, Slatten said, to establish they had been written by the same person. "W. C. Johnson" was the name investigators said the found Tallman had assumed in his recent associations with Mrs. Patty, whom he first met a year ago when he was radio operator on the Admiral Benson. The name also was found on telephone slips in Mrs. Patty's apartment in another section of the city.

Slatten was awaiting comparison of finger prints taken from walls of the closet with records at the state bureau of criminal identification at Sacramento, for a final check of the identity of the person who tied the young woman's body against the closet wall.

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Show the children how to like vegetables
