Bob O'Farrell registered in the city yesterday from Dorris. He is here for business purposes.

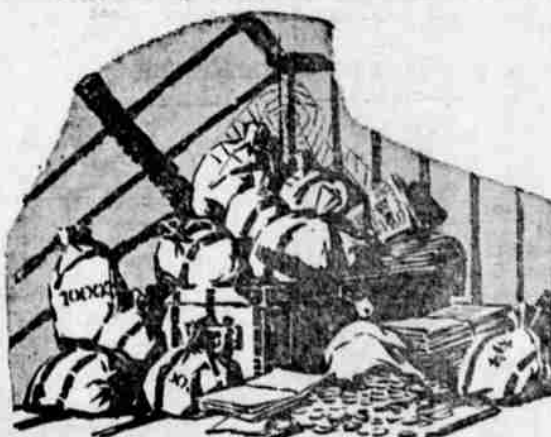

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District Will Initiate Move to Get Taxes

The directors of the Klamath Irrigation district have instructed Attorney E. L. Elliott, assisted by the secretary of the district, to obtain ratifications of delinquency on all lands within the district on which the 1927 taxes have not been paid. This action was taken to secure the remainder of the money necessary to meet the obligation of the district to the bureau of reclamation.

Heretofore irrigation districts have been hampered in enforcing tax collections by the fact that landowners who fail to pay their irrigation charges usually fail also to pay their state and county taxes, and before the district officials could obtain certificates of delinquency or foreclosures on land it was necessary for them to take the district funds the cash necessary to pay the state and county taxes.

The Klamath delegation attending the last legislature secured the passage of an act that enables irrigation districts to obtain certificates of delinquency, to foreclose and sell lands without putting up any cash at all, the lands being sold, of course, subject to the lien of the state and county taxes due.

Another new law secured by the Klamath delegation is the blanket foreclosure law which permits making a number of foreclosures in one legal action. This will to some degree expedite and considerably lessen the cost of foreclosures. The Klamath district will in the present event take advantage of both these laws.

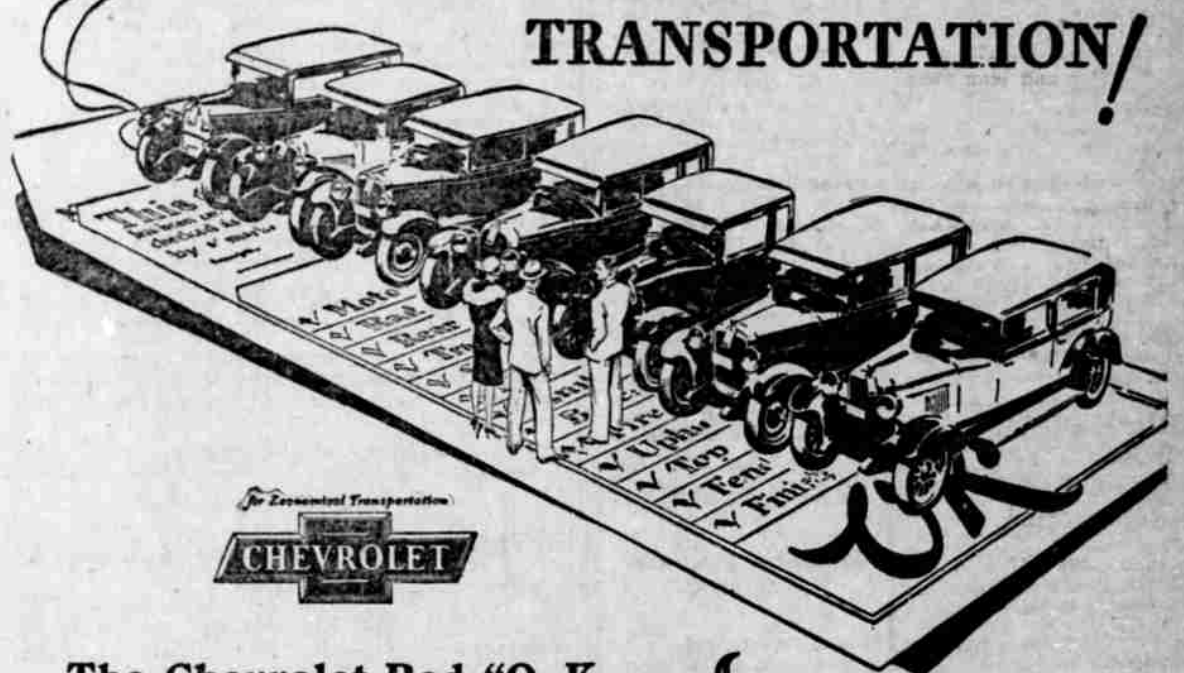
