Use of Books In City Gains

A report sent out recently to the state librarian at Salem from the city library showed a considerable increase in circulation for the past month.

In May, 1929, over one thousand more books were circulated in Klamath Falls than in May of the preceding year. This is an unusual increase, due to the fact that in this city the librarian allows only two fiction books to be taken out on one card, whereas in other cities they may take out more. Fiction constitutes about two-thirds of the daily circulation of books.

The yearly report sent out by Miss Hawkins, city librarian, shows that in 1927 there was an increase of 13,000 books over the year before and an additional increase over that of more than 4,000 for last year. Records being kept so far this year point out that a much greater circulation will be shown this year. More than 70,000 persons used the reading room in the city library during the past year.

A letter congratulating this library has been received from Salem for the marvelous growth shown recently. A report of it was published in the Statistics of Oregon Free Public Libraries.

Many new books are being added to the shelves and the children's library is receiving special attention.
