Need of Public Support For Lumber Industries Apparent Says Northwest Authority

The apathetic interest which the general public throughout the northwest takes in the lumber industry is at times appalling when it is borne in mind that over 60 cents of every dollar coming into Oregon and Washington is for timber products of some sort and the harvesting and manufacturing of this, our greatest resource, is, without a doubt, the basic industry upon which the prosperity of all lines of business is in a large measure dependent.

Too many people take the attitude that the lumbermen do not need any support or aid in order to make the most of their opportunities, and it is therefore often difficult for lumbermen to get the moral backing of their benefactors when it should come without the asking. Back in Washington, D. C., where they are accustomed to well-organized and concerted appeals for recognition of sectional problems, the cry of the lumbermen in Oregon and Washington for relief, without being widely supported by

the general public, is liable to be accepted as the pious wail of a few disaffected business men and never given the consideration to which it is entitled.

Such an exigency exists right here today, for without the proper sort of relief, one of the most important branches of the lumber industry is threatened with extermination.

Red Cedar of Importance

In western Oregon and Washington it is conservatively estimated that there are over forty-nine billion feet of red cedar timber. Unfortunately, red cedar, with very rare exceptions, does not grow in solid stands, but is mixed with other species of softwood, such as Douglas fir, Sitka spruce and western hemlock. In footage it is small in comparison with the other woods and is therefore never logged alone. In other words, the red cedar must be taken along with the Douglas fir, Sitka spruce and western hemlock, or not at all, as no one could afford to take out cedar without the other species, nor to go back and get it later if left standing when the other soft woods were removed.

It is therefore easily seen that as long as the saw mills continue to operate we must make provision for disposing of the red cedar or leave this great stand of 49,000,000,000 feet of merchantable timber stand and rot where it has grown, for most of the red cedar is mature and ready to be cut.

Shingle Tariff Big Need

In 1913 the tariff on shingles and red cedar lumber was removed. Since that time over 50 per cent of the shingle mills in Oregon and Washington have gone bankrupt and conditions have steadily grown worse. The principal reason for this demoralized position in which the shingle industry has been placed is the unfair competition coming from the Canadian mills.

Shingle mills in Oregon and Washington are compelled to employ American labor and pay wages which will permit of white men living up to American standards, but that is not true in Canada, where over 75 per cent of the shingle and red cedar lumber production comes from mills that employ Chinese, Japanese and Hindus.

It has long since been recognized that American labor could not compete with Oriental labor, as was given positive expression in our Oriental exclusion law, yet, through allowing the Canadian manufacturers to market the product of their mills in this country on an equal basis with the mills in Oregon and Washington, the very purpose of the Oriental exclusion act is defeated.

Canada Scores Huge Gains

If anyone doubts the menace that this unfair competition is to the industry in Oregon and Washington he has only to be told that since the tariff was taken off of shingles and red cedar lumber in 1913, the business of the Canadian mills with

the United States has increased over 400 per cent and today the Canadian mills are marketing more than 90 per cent of their shingles in this country.

While this has been going on it has frequently happened that the Canadian manufacturers, with their mills manned with Orientals, who would not be permitted to enter this country, have been operating day and night shifts, while the American mills could not meet their competition and run one shift. This is true to the extent that the influx of Canadian shingles has grown to the point where they are disposing of 2,500,000,000 shingles here annually, and the production of shingles in Oregon and Washington has, during this period, continued to decline.

Over fifty million dollars are invested in shingle mills in Oregon and Washington. Ten thousand people are given employment when conditions permit of the mills operating on a normal basis, but with the Oriental competition of the Canadian mills the employees of the shingle mills are at present not averaging much over two-thirds time straight through the year.

Other Industries Affected

The lumbermen are asking for a 25 per cent ad valorem tariff on shingles. This will not prevent the Canadian mills from coming into this market, nor will it work any hardship on the users of shingles, but it will place the mills in Oregon and Washington in a position where they can pay reasonable wages, operate steadily and utilize efficiently all of the cedar timber as it is harvested along with the other species among which it grows.

Persons in other lines of business need only ask themselves whether they could use any of that annual pay roll of \$12,000,000, for it all flows out into the channels of business so that everyone, from the bootblack to the banker, gets his share.

The biggest crop to be harvested for many years in this part of the country is lumber, and the sooner the general public realizes this and becomes "lumber minded" and gets behind the lumbermen when they

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
