PIRATES HOLD ON TO LEAGUE LEAD GRIMLY

Occupy Top Only By Margin of One Half Game

After developing a strange facility for losing ball games to Brooklyn, the Pirates executed a smart about-face at Forbes Field yesterday just in time to save themselves from the ferocious Robins—and a plunge into second place. Brooklyn had in the making a double-play which would have ended the game in its own favor, but Dave Bancroft slipped off a wry toss to first base for the second half of the intended double-killing, and two Pirate runners scored, winning the game by 1 to 2.

Retain Lead

The Pirates remained half a game behind the Cardinals in a game count, but retained first place on a per centage margin through having played fewer engagements. The Cardinals stepped all over the Phillies as Hal Hald pitched good ball. Frank Frisch aided Hald with a home run, a triple and two singles as Frank O'Doul hit his twelfth homer for the Phils.

The Giants regained their stride by defeating Cincinnati, 9 to 6, through the second shut-out effort of big Fred Fitzsimmons in four days.

Yanks Win

The Yankees took further steps toward converting the American league race into a two-team struggle by winning their third straight from the Browns, 11 to 5.

Although the Red Sox outlit the Tigers by 11 to 7 at the ferry, the western team bunched its hits to advantage, winning by 6 to 1.

Washington batsmen went on another rampage behind Fred Marberry to defeat the Indians at the capitol by 13 to 3.

SWIM CHAMPS LOSE STANDING

NEW YORK, June 12, (AP)—The heavy hand of the amateur athletic union has fallen on two more Olympic champions, Martha Norelius and Helen Meany.

Found guilty of giving unauthorized exhibitions with professionals, Miss Norelius was indefinitely suspended and Miss Meany declared "ineligible to compete as an amateur" by the registration committee of the A. U. yesterday. It was this same body which, in February, set down Ray Barbati, Olympic 400-meter champion, after he had charged that officials of track meets had paid excess expense money to star performers.

In announcing its decision, the committee ruled that Miss Norelius, 400 meter free style swimming champion at the last Olympics, must give up all prizes she won at the National Women's championship at Chicago.

WIFE RELATES HOW PROH COP KILLED SPOUSE

Says First Shot Killed Henry Virkula Saturday Night

ELEVETH, Minn., June 12, (UP)—Mrs. Henry Virkula, widow of the Big Falls confectioner who was shot and killed by Emmett J. White, border customs agent, near International Falls Saturday night, arrived last night with her husband's body.

Burial is to take place Wednesday afternoon.

Speaking in a calm manner and occasionally raising her voice with much feeling, she told the United Press her version of the fatal shooting.

"Everyone is very kind to me," she began, "but it is too late to do anything now. You say they have started a bill in congress to give me \$25,000. That is very nice, but nothing can bring back my husband."

Setting up straight in her chair and clenching her hands tightly, Mrs. Virkula spoke slowly:

"I can hope that his death will be a lesson to these officers everywhere, so that other innocent persons won't be sacrificed in the same way.

"Those men must have seen me though they could not see our two little girls in the back seat. There was a bright light on the highway, and surely they saw that I was a woman.

"While claimed they fired into the ground once when they thought we were not going to stop. He said he then shot several times at the tires."

"I may be wrong, for I was excited at the time. But I am almost willing to swear that it was the first shot fired which killed by husband."

WASHINGTON, June 12, (UP)—Indignation aroused by reports of two new prohibition shootings gave promise today of hastening the reorganization of federal law enforcement agencies advocated by President Hoover.

Newspaper accounts of the slaying at International Falls, Minn., of Henry Virkula and the perhaps fatal shooting at Detroit, Mich., of Archibald Eagster, both by United States border patrolmen, produced a storm of resolutions and oratory in the house.

This is not uncommon. More than 130 civilians have been killed by federal agents seeking to enforce the prohibition law since it became effective ten years ago and many of these incidents have been protested by members of the house and senate without resulting in any definite action.

The cumulative effect of these killings, however, has been to convince many congressmen, that steps must be taken to curb violence in prohibition enforcement, especially among the legislators, classed neither as militant wets nor dries.

THE RULE IS!

The Situation: What rule applies where the ball is played into the rough and necessitates a search?

The Rule Is: In searching for a ball in the rough, bushes and long grass may be touched by the player only insofar as it is necessary for him to find the ball. If ball is not found in five minutes, it is declared lost. If ball is found, no living plant, tree, etc., may be bent, broken or cut away to enable a clearer vision of the ball or a clearer execution of the stroke.

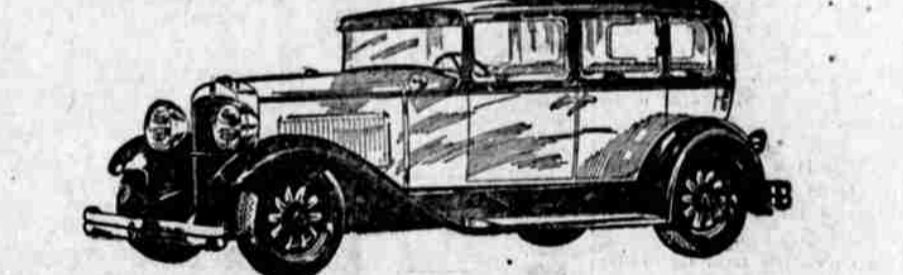
