

### Sleeping Sickness Scourge of Tropical Africa Will Be Pictured, Explained Tonight

Sleeping sickness, the scourge of tropical Africa will be explained to the people of Klamath Falls tonight, with the arrival of L. Earl Deane, commissioned by the Colonial Government to make movies of the malady.

### HOUSE BACKS UP PRESIDENT

### SALARIES FOR JUDGES RAISED

### Klamath Jurist to Receive \$5,000 a Year According to New Law

SALEM, Ore., June 13, (AP)—A readjustment in the salaries of Oregon circuit judges, provided for by an act of the 1929 legislature, was made public yesterday by Secretary of State Hal E. Ross.

Under the new law judges in judicial district having population of 30,000 or more shall receive \$6000 a year, with \$500 additional provided locally in the case of Multnomah county. Judges in districts having between 15,000 and 30,000 population shall receive \$5500, and those in districts of less than 15,000 receive \$5000.

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Campbell, Clackamas county; James Alger Lee, Umatilla county; Arlie G. Walker, Polk and Yamhill counties; George H. Bagley, Washington and Tillamook counties; H. K. Zimmerman, Clatsop and Columbia counties.

Judges in the \$5500 class are: H. D. Morton, Jackson and Josephine counties; Fred W. Wilson, Hood River and Wasco counties; C. H. McColloch, Baker county; W. W. Wood, Grant, Harney and Wheeler counties; J. W. Knowles, Union and Wallowa counties; T. E. J. Duffy, Deschutes, Crook and Jefferson counties.

In the \$5000 class are D. R. Parker, Gilliam, Sherman and Wheeler counties; W. M. Duncan, Klamath county; and Orlando M. Calkins, Lake county.

The new law became effective June 4. Under the old law all judges of the circuit court received \$4000 with \$1500 additional provided locally for those in Multnomah county.

ENGLAND IS SLOWLY WASHING TO SEA. By NEA Service. LONDON, June 13.—The sea is claiming England at the rate of 40 feet a year. The town council of Lowestoft recently met to consider means of building barriers to prevent the washing away of the land in its vicinity. At Pakefield, a village near Lowestoft, the sea has been gaining on the land at an average rate of 10 feet a year. Erosion is felt in other places in England. A road at Penmaenbach is endangered. A suggested plan is to remove this road, and to tunnel through a cliff bordering the sea.

### TAX BODY OF STATE MEETS

SALEM, Ore., June 13, (AP)—The new state tax commission, created by the 1929 legislature, called its first meeting here Tuesday afternoon and organized Earl Fisher, who has been state tax commissioner for several years, was elected chairman, and John H. Carlin of Medford, in addition to the other duties of his position, will serve as secretary. The third member of the commission is Charles V. Galloway of Portland, who prior to his affiliation with the Hibernia bank had for a number of years been state tax commissioner.

Under the new super-tax commission act Fisher was given charge of the assessment of public utilities, Galloway the equalization of local assessments, and Carlin the administration of the new state revenue measures.
