PUGILISTS ARE IN GOOD SHAPE FOR FIGHT CARD

Long Walks and Light Workouts are Scheduled for Today.

Long walks and light workouts are the order of the day for fighters who will appear on the boxing card to be staged in the Legion Memorial pavilion tomorrow night. Every fight gives promise of action and the advance ticket sale indicates a large house.

Sailor Lenhart and Jess De Motta, both light heavyweights, have been pronounced in first class condition and a slugger is expected when the two fast boys clash. Lenhart in his last 32 battles has won 30 and the two losses chalked up against him were the result of fighting heavyweights where he was forced to five away from 39 to 50 pounds. Before being discharged from the navy last year, the sailor won the army-navy title by winning 40 straight fights.

De Motta, his opponent will weigh within a pound of the ex-gob's weight and no alibi on this count can be offered. De Motta who was raised in the Merrill-Malm section later travelled to California where he tangled with men who are well known where-

ever fistie contests are held. Jack Malone, Dusky Miller, Armand Emanuel and a host of others as well known have opposed De Motta in the square circle. The Klamath boy should be at his best against Lenhart and perfect condition of both presages a fine fight.

From the point of interest no bout held here during the past few months could equal the enthusiasm shown by fans over the scheduled ten round clash between Ray Huffman and Frankie Warneke. More than a boxing contest is in prospect when the two lads meet. It is hard to believe at this time that there is such a thing as a grudge battle as the grudge mixers have been taken their place on the shelf with the old oaken bucket. However, no greater rivalry has ever been witnessed than exists between the two flashy welters.

Both Huffman and Warneke expect to win and there must be a loser as the bout is winner to take all as well as the northwest welterweight title. Huffman holds victories over the best in the state of Washington and Warneke has defeated all of the good welters in Oregon. Only the fact that both are in the best of condition gives prospects of the bout going the limit.

After losing a four round decision to Eddie Edleman last week Earl Forse asked for another chance. The two fighters this time will meet over the six round route and Forse expects to win. Both have been training hard, Edleman boxing Warneke every day and Forse going against Huffman. Last night in his workout Forse showed a great improvement and the result

should be different in tomorrow's bout. Mahros Byrners, a newcomer from Lakeview, will meet tough little Frankie Monroe in one of the four round bouts. Byrners has been training by the kayo method but against Monroe is meeting a boy who says little and pays little attention to knockouts, and who always fights.

Jack Lewis, the game boy who fought Murphy in the last card, will fight Eddie O'Connor of Klamath Falls in the opener which will start promptly at 8:45 p. m.

Tickets for the bout are on sale at the Mecca Billiard Parlor until Friday evening. After that time they may be purchased at the Legion pavilion.

wildest of all wild west shows. Modoc Johnnie who was born in a sage brush and juniper cabin on the old Blue Bucket trail, and who speaks the Indian tongue and sign language, learned from Indian boyhood playmates, will welcome these Indian chiefs and their tribes in Indian tongue, which will be immediately interpreted and broadcasted to the different stations and loud-speakers in the grand stand and grounds.

The Indian village on the fair grounds will have several thousand inhabitants and with the tall topees occupying most of the available space, it will present a most spectacular appearance.

Indian baseball teams will be on hand to compete with each other, and the crack ball team club winner of last year's tournament is again coming from Pendleton to defend their title.

The mornings will be devoted to numerous Indian orations and other events.

The Indian Queen chosen from all the different tribes will appear in native costume at all special events, prizes will be awarded for the best costumes.

At night the Krokos Amusement company of California will furnish the down-town carnival attraction. Each night dances will be conducted by the American Legion building, and the Altamont pavilion, with music being furnished by Novak's Vaudeville, the noted girl band of Portland, Oregon, and Jack Bowring's band of Klamath Falls, who needs no further introduction on the Pacific coast.

On the night of July the fourth there will be a reproduction of the Modoc Indian war presented in front of the grandstand, which will recall history of the early pioneer days. The darkness will be illuminated with flares and fireworks costing thousands of dollars, hundreds of warriors with their ponies, the National Guard Indian trappers and scouts, will reproduce one of the most thrilling spectacular, and realistic Indian war dramas ever presented.

Through the kindness and courtesy of the Lakewick Round-up association, as an added attraction Miss Lucy Paxton, beautiful 1928 Rodeo Queen of the last frontier town, will sponsor an exhibition of wild horse riding in front of the grand stand each day. put it out at interest," Mr. Sabo said.

Henry Perkins, attorney discussed the matter at length this morning with a reporter on The Herald, declaring himself in favor

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of taking the \$75,000 and the property.

"A close study of the property makes me believe that this property could be made into a splendid civic center," Mr. Perkins said. A park, city hall, armory and other improvements would be possible.

"How about the question of real estate men entering into the fight to sell the property for other purposes?" Mr. Perkins was asked.

"I feel sure that if the people vote to take the \$75,000 and the property it will be used for the right purposes," he concluded.

F. R. Olds, member of the city council, stands for taking the property and cash settlement of \$75,000.

"Take the property and cash," W. C. Mac Ilea of Shaw Mac Ilea said. "I go on record for this with Veterans of Foreign Wars," he concluded.

Keith Ambrose, chief of police, feels the city should take the property and \$75,000. "I am in a position to realize how badly a city hall is needed; the quarters are entirely too small. Then too, like many others I feel an armory and Municipal Park is needed."

J. E. Hoising of Dale and Hoising, is of the opinion the city should take the property and cash settlement.

"Take the \$150,000 cash and keep this issue out of politics," said J. Joseph Justin of Justin and Montgomery.

Paul Campbell of The Klamath Hardware believes the city should take the \$150,000 cash and place the money out at interest. "I believe by taking the cash, we would find ourselves less apt to be in a political mix-up than if we took the property and the cash settlement of \$75,000."

"Cash talks, take the \$150,000," Wilbur Kennett of The Brownville Woolen Mills said. It seems to me the surest bet and I think less politics could

enter into the matter with the acceptance of the cash."

E. Hardenbrook of The Blue Bird discussed the matter at length with a reporter of The Herald this morning. "I've thought this matter over and feel the city should vote to take the property and the \$75,000," Mr. Hardenbrook said.

Irving Joseph of the K. Sugarman store is of the opinion that the city should accept the offer of \$75,000 and the property which has been appraised at \$148,000 by the appraisal board made up of Joel T. Ward, A. J. Tracy and D. M. Smith. "It might be true the appraisal is high but we all realize the need of an army, city hall and a municipal park. Yes I think the wise thing to do is take the property and the \$75,000 cash."

"Money talks," I have thought this over and studied the decisions of the various civic bodies on the question, but still feel at the proper thing to do is take the \$150,000 cash," Del Reeder, advertising manager for The Golden Rule said.

"Like many others, I am convinced we need a municipal center for the working man; then too an armory is needed as well as a new city hall in the not too distant future," T. S. Green of the K. Sugarman Store stated. To me the right thing to do is take the property and cash."

"Take the \$150,000 cash, it is the safe and sensible way to do," Lester Kirkpatrick of The Brownville Woolen Mills Store said today.

A. E. Whitman of The Whitman Drug Store, after studying the proposition from every angle believes the proper thing for the people to do is accept the cash offer of \$150,000.

"This is a most important matter which the people of Klamath Falls should give serious thought, not just decide on snap judgment what is to be done," Mr. Whitman stated.
