

Double Main Event Will Be Feature Of Fight Card Tonight

WARNEKE WILL MEET HUFFMAN IN ONE MATCH

Other Half of Twin Bill Will be Between Lenhart and DeMotte.

With Eagles from every section of Oregon expected to attend, along with hundreds of Klamath Falls, one of the largest crowds to attend a boxing card in months is expected to jam into Legion Memorial hall tonight.

From the top attractions to the humble preliminaries, the card is well balanced and promises action and fistie fireworks through out. The preliminary and semi-windup talent may steal the show from the two main events.

The fight between Warneke and Huffman takes on an interstate aspect. It is claimed that Warneke has no peer in his class in Oregon while Huffman claims the same distinction for Washington. The bout is announced as the welterweight championship bout of the northwest. Entirely aside from this feature, is the rivalry of the two boys. They come from two rival pugilistic camps—Huffman is under Tommy Webb; Warneke under Frank Church. The winner takes all in the bout tonight. Their last fight, a six rounder, was by all odds the best attraction on the card.

Denny Lenhart, the slugging sailor, will have a chance to make good tonight against a man his own weight, Jess DeMotte. Lenhart gave away 33 pounds to Earl Ritchie and was cutting the beam to pieces when he happened to run into one pile driving left to the solar plexus—that was enough. De Motte is an ex-Merrill boy who has been

fighting big timers in California for several years. Both boys will step into the ring weighing around 170 pounds each.

Lenhart has won 30 his last 32 battles; De Motte's opponents include Armand Emanuel.

Cash customers are likely to see the tables turned in the fistie fight between Earl Forse, former navy-army lightweight and welterweight champion, and Eddie Edelman, hard smashing and game little Indian. Forse was touted to win on the last card but lost a close nod when Edelman staged a sensational rally in the last round. Forse blamed altitude for his poor showing and begged for another chance at the swarthy skinned pugilist. It was granted and he will go into the ring determined to wipe out the defeat of one week ago.

Little curly-haired buzz-saw Frankie Monroe, a Klamath favorite, steps into the ring tonight with Mahrs Rymers, a Lakeview boy, who is a "big shot" in that part of the country. The boys are lightweights and will go for four rounds.

Eddie O'Connor, hard hitting and game, will cross gloves with Jackie Lewis who appeared on the last card.

Fights start promptly at 8:45 p. m.

"Always remember when putting that the hole cannot move," Walter Hagen told me one day at the Pasadena Country Club, Florida, when I inquired about his uncanny ability on the greens.

"After lining up your putt and noting the undulations of the green and the distance you are away from the can, just look at the cup once and remember it is stationary and cannot move. Constantly glancing back and forth is confusing and tends to destroy the line of your putt.

"Whether to putt fast or slow depends on the individual. As Tom Ross, the old Scotch pro replied when asked how much time should be taken in putting: "Putt when you're ready."

JOHN DAWSON WINS ANOTHER

American Amateur Wins Way Into British Semi-Finals.

SANDWICH, Eng., June 14. (AP)—John Dawson, young American amateur who has been steadily sweeping his way through the British amateur golf championship tournament, entered the semi-finals today with the most convincing display of golf he has yet given the championship gallery here.

The sole surviving American in the field, Dawson started out this morning with A. J. Evans, London barrister, and Kent county cricket star, and came back six up and five to play, taking three holes in a row after the turn.

Outclassing Evans with every club, the young American took the first two holes. He had several had ones but never looked like making a mistake after holing a ten-footer for a birdie two at the eighth. He took the ninth, tenth, eleventh and 12th, thus winning five straight holes and becoming dormie at the thirteenth.

John Smith, Scottish carpenter, finally conquered the Hon. Michael Scott, 2 and 1, thus gaining the right to meet Dawson in the semi-finals this afternoon.

THE RULE IS!

The Situations A and B both lie on the putting green. A's ball lies within six inches of B's ball. May either ball be moved in such a situation?

The Rule Is! When two balls lie within six inches of each other on the putting green, the ball closer to the hole, with consent of opponent, may be lifted until far ball has been played. Then it shall be replaced as near as possible in its original position. No penalty is incurred if either ball is accidentally moved while complying with this rule.

VAN DUSEN IS FAVORITE FOR \$50,000 DERBEY

CHICAGO, June 14. (AP)—Another battle in the mud is the almost certain prospect for the \$50,000 American derby which will be decided among three-year-olds over a mile and a quarter at Washington park tomorrow.

Three days and nights of heavy rain had churned the course into a quagmire and no amount of sunshine is likely to

make it fast by post time. The tracks condition has made Clyde Van Dusen, which splashed through the mud to win the Kentucky derby, an overwhelming favorite. The night son of man o'war today was quoted at \$ to 5 with indications the odds would drop to 7 to 5 or less by post time.

CLAIM \$2,281.35 DUE FOR LOGGING WORK
