

## French Legion Fights Rebels Under Hot Sun

RABAT, Morocco, June 14. (U.P.)—Eight battalions of France's famous Foreign Legion struggled across the sandy upper plateaus of the Atlas mountains last night in one of the most difficult punitive expeditions ever undertaken in that sun-broiled country known as the "hell-hole of Africa."

The strongest and most daring men in the French military service were establishing a wide front in the mountain country to combat savage rebel tribes who twice attacked outposts this week and who now hold 76 French soldiers as prisoners. Latest reports from the outposts said the rebels were besieging the little fort near Yacoub. French aviators flew over the forts attempting to drop food and medicine to the wounded and hungry soldiers who were almost out of provisions.

All planes flying in the rebel area were met with repeated volleys of rifle fire from the ground. The campaign to rescue the prisoners from probable torture or death, as described in the reports received here, tonight became one of the outstanding feats of a foreign legion known throughout the world for the courage of its men in face of great hazards and almost unbearable climates.

It started this week with an attack of a detachment of Kiltie and white troops by a fierce band of mountain horsemen. The French soldiers were ambushed and cut down. Thirteen were killed and many wounded and 79 of the remainder taken prisoners.

The rebels, flushed with success, followed up with a vicious night attack on the outer fort at Alt Yakoub Wednesday afternoon, determined to capture the post. The wounded and shattered troops stationed there defended it bravely until French airplanes came to their aid and dropped 600 bombs in a four-hour battle before the rebels were scattered. Friendly Moors assisted in the defense, attacking the rebels on the flank and killing 35.

## LINDBERGH AND WIFE YACHTING STILL, REPORT

BIDDEFORD, Me., June 14. (U.P.)—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh and his bride were believed today to have seen the take-off of the Yellow Bird for Paris.

The Mouette, the motor yacht on which the famous flyer is spending his honeymoon, put in to "the pier," a little fishing village near here this afternoon to refuel.

At 3 p. m., Jim Anderson, keeper at the Goat Island light, sighted the Mouette coming from an easterly direction, apparently having been cruising in the vicinity of Old Orchard during the day.

The Mouette went to Cape Porpoise for fuel and provisions and then headed in a westerly direction.

## DR. WILBUR TO GIVE ADDRESS IN ROSE CITY

PORTLAND, Ore., June 14. (U.P.)—Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, secretary of the Interior, has re-routed his trip to Honolulu in order to be present at the American Medical Association convention in Portland. The convention will be held July 8-12. Dr. Wilbur will attend a special session sponsored by medical veterans of the World War July 8, at which the chief topic will be aviation medicine.
