

ROBERT SPROUL NEW PRESIDENT OF CALIFORNIA

**Vice-President Elevated
to High Post of Re-
gent's Board**

SAN FRANCISCO, June 14. (AP)—Robert G. Sproul, who worked his way through the University of California to graduate with the class of 1913, was named president of the institution Tuesday by the board of regents in an executive session at which no other names were proposed.

Sproul, who has been controller and vice-president of the university since 1920, will assume the presidency when the resignation of Dr. W. W. Campbell becomes effective on June 1, 1930. Members of the board of regents said Sproul received the unanimous vote of that body when his name was proposed.

The new president answered the requirement of the regents for a business executive as well as a scholastic administrator. He is 38 years old and a favorite with faculty and students as well.

The selection of Sproul came with remarkable suddenness while many prominent educators were preparing to have themselves considered for the place.

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MRS. COREY JILTED BY HER PRINCE

PARIS, June 14, (AP)—The wedding of Prince Louis De Bourbon, cousin of the King of Spain, and Mrs. Mabelle Gilman Corey, divorced wife of the Pittsburgh steel magnate, has been "indefinitely postponed" and in all likelihood never will take place at all.

The errant prince, who has not communicated with his fiancée for almost a fortnight, sent a letter to one of his Paris friends today saying he had decided he did not want to marry Mrs. Corey and was disappointed with the settlement she had agreed to make upon him.

The prince's letter was written from San Remo, Italy, where his mother, the infant Eulalie, King Alfonso's aunt, has bought a villa for him. Mrs. Corey at present is at her chateau, De Villegentis, near Paris.

The infant Eulalie, who resides in Paris, told the Associated Press that the wedding has been "indefinitely postponed."

Mrs. Corey's sister, Mrs. Thomas, said rather reluctantly: "The engagement has not been broken but you never can tell what might happen."

From one of Prince Louis' closest friends it was learned Mrs. Corey had settled a fund of \$200,000 upon the prince which would give him \$1,000 a month "for pocket money—just for cigarettes and things like that as Mrs. Corey had agreed to provide a home for them both in addition." It was this settlement which the prince considered inadequate.
