DAWN TO DUSK RECORD SOUGHT BY LIEUTENANT

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., June 18. (AP)—Lieutenant John S. Griffith, pursuit instructor at Kelly Field, hopped off from Kelly Field at 2:40 o'clock this morning for Seattle, Wash., trying for a dawn to dusk flight record. The air line distance is about 2,200 miles.

If successful, Lieutenant Griffith expects to reach his destination at 8 p. m. Pacific coast time. He is flying a P-1-B pursuit plane.

Lieutenant Griffith is flying one of the ships "off the line" at the field and no special arrangements were made for the flight. Five stops will be made for refueling and re-servicing the plane. These will be at El Paso, Tucson, Ariz.; March Field, Calif.; Ory Field, Calif.; and Medford, Ore.
