

TWO BOYS LOST IN UNDERBRUSH

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Little children are believed to be wandering.

The mothers of the two tots, Mrs. Cecil Lowe and Mrs. H. B. Devine were in a state of collapse today while the fathers were desperately covering miles of territory in an effort to locate some trace of their little ones. If the search this afternoon does not result successfully, it is quite probable that bloodhounds will be shipped into Klamath from Salem to follow the tracks of the boys.

Huster, Jackie and two other little boys named Mustoe, set forth yesterday morning to play in the woods. They wandered far from camp.

About four and one half miles from camp, the Mustoe boys became separated from Jackie and Huster. The Mustoes, who were several years older, managed to make their way back to camp, arriving there about 3:30 p. m.

When the other children failed to put in an appearance, a search was immediately started that ran in size as the hours passed. Throughout the cold night—it was freezing weather in the forest last night—loggers combed the forest. Fires were lit and guns fired.

This morning, footprints of the children were discovered, showing that they were wandering aimlessly. But they could not be followed through the thick network of brambles.

The search broadened in scope, and, under the direction of Claude Houghton, logging superintendent, different parties, systematically covered the area where the boys are believed to be. But their efforts were all for naught up to 3:30 p. m. today.

Without food or drink, it is felt that the little boys may become exhausted and sink down in a semi-conscious state in the center of the brush land. In that case, they would not have the strength to walk towards any fire, or towards the sound of a gun.

Some conception of the seriousness of the situation was revealed this afternoon by Mrs. Claude Houghton.

"The situation is terrible," said Mrs. Houghton who is deeply distressed. "You have no idea how thick that brush is. Even the loggers frequently became lost and it became necessary on several occasions for searching parties to double back and pick them up. Also the men would come out of the brush with their clothes torn and bleeding from scratches."

"If the little children are not found tonight, bloodhounds should be secured to aid in the search. That would be the only chance. The poor mothers are frantic and the other women in the camp in almost the same state. My little boy wanted to go along on the trip yesterday morning but I wouldn't let him. It would not be so bad if it were open forest; but the brush is a thick bramble and almost impassable."

W. E. Lamm, president of the Lamm Lumber company left today for the camp where he will take charge of the search.

Over long distance telephone this morning he said the situation was very serious.

tered in the enforcement of the law along the border was due to mechanism of criminals who were trying to violate the law.

"I deeply deplore the killing of any person," the President said. "The treasury is making a constant effort to prevent misuse of firearms. I hope communities along the border will help the treasury to prevent the systematic war being carried on by international criminals which I believe is the root of all our troubles."

The president's statement was in answer to questions submitted by press correspondents about the killing of three persons by customs border patrol.

The official stenographic transcript of Mr. Hoover's reply to prohibition questions made available later was as follows: "I have some questions as to the incidents on the border. I deeply deplore the killing of any person. The treasury department is making every effort to prevent the misuse of arms. Any case of misuse will be determined by the orderly proceedings of the department and the courts. I hope that the communities along the border will do their best to help the treasury and the systematic war that is being carried on by international criminals against the laws of the United States. It is these activities that are at the root of all our difficulties."

Improvement unit 52 includes Pacific Terrace from Del Moro to Van Ness avenue, Del Moro street, LeRoy street and Eldorado avenue.

Due to a conditional bid received on improvement unit 72, and on account of a misunderstanding between the council and the bidder, two bids on this unit were submitted two weeks ago. The unit will be re-advertised and bids will be opened Monday night, July 1.

Upon a recommendation of the council as a whole, the city bus franchise was awarded to Francis A. Oulton, of Portland.

The police committee recommended that a resolution be adopted co-operating with the city ministerial association which is seeking to prohibit cigarette advertising detrimental to women and girls.

QUAKE VISITS NEW ZEALAND

WELLINGTON, New Zealand, June 18, (AP)—Further earth shocks were felt last night and today, adding to damage wrought by Sunday's tremors. The sixth fatality was reported with the death of a man in a mine at Seddonville.

Government airplanes have been sent to Westport and Grey-mouth which both are practically isolated through damage to telegraph wires. Railroads are badly crippled with the roadway from Glenhope to Owen completely covered with earth and boulders.

ROGUE CROP TO GO OVER LINE

In Nevada, and again at Ogden, Utah. Details of the new route, the Mail-Tribune has learned, are now being evolved by the Pacific Fruit Express and the Southern Pacific.

The change from the fruit shippers' standpoint would mean the saving of one auction day on all eastern markets, and the saving of from 15 to 20 hours in transit. The heat of the Sacramento valley and the traffic congestion at the Roseville, Calif., long station would be avoided.

From the railroad point of view it would mean one-third less haul than via Sacramento, elimination of the heavy grades and curves of the Sierras, and a more economical handling of the rich fruit business of the Rogue River valley. It will mean, too, that Rogue River valley fruit will proceed in train lots, direct to the east with a substantial decrease in switching at terminal points. Arrangements have been made for the dispatching of two fruit trains daily during the height of the season.
