PROGRESS MADE IN BUILDING OF NEW PICKERING MILL AT ALTURAS; FRAMEWORK IS UP

ALTURAS, Cal., June 19.—Practically all departments of the Pickering Lumber company's mills here are under construction and a view of the mill site at the present stage of work presents a good picture of the size of the operation when the first sawmill unit is opened.

The structural steel framework of the mill is practically all in place, and floors probably will be laid ready for the installation of machinery within a short time. Steel construction has been used for the sorting chain sheds from the mill, and the framework for the chain is under construction. Foundations are completed for the power plant which will be located near the mill pond immediately east of the space which is being left for the second sawmill unit. Steel was going up this week

at the planing mill, the factory which is located nearest the city, and the dry sorting sheds were well under way. One of the most interesting features of the recent work at the plant is the construction of the first of 36 dry kilns which will be used for seasoning the lumber. These kilns are being built along the most modern scientific lines to dry the lumber in the quickest and most efficient manner. They will be located immediately north of the dry sorting sheds which is one of the largest buildings on the property.

Steam shovels and scrapers are at work on the mill pond, and a large dyke is being thrown up at the northwest corner of the pond. Within a short time the pond will be practically completed.

FACTORY WILL BE STARTED ON 20TH OF JUNE

Klamath Men Acquire and Develop Mill Property in Lakeview

LAKEVIEW, Ore., June 19.—The whistle will blow, the steam will hiss and the wheels will turn at the Lakeview Manufacturing company's box factory about June 20, George Gerbino, manager and part owner in the company, announced early this week.

After a period of remodeling the old Edgerton and Adams planing mill, purchased by Mr. Gerbino and H. C. Merryman of Klamath Falls this winter, the plant will get under way with considerable additional machinery installed.

A twin band saw and a printer will be installed before the plant is started next week and with the present equipment of a single band saw and a band rip the factory will be well equipped to

run at a capacity of about 40,000 daily.

Increasing the steam power of the plant by installing a new boiler of 150 pounds pressure is also one of the additions made.

The storage and drying yards have been cleaned and leveled off and some old buildings removed to make room for about four million feet of lumber which is coming from the Adams mill on Camas prairie. The yard is to be increased to about seven million capacity late, Mr. Gerbino states. New track is to be installed and a system of runways built for rapid and economical handling of the lumber in the yard.

The plant will operate one shift at present with a crew of from 25 to 30 men. The majority of the crew will be made up of local men while several experienced box factory hands will be brought from Klamath Falls.

Mr. Gerbino states that the investment that will be represented in the plant will exceed \$45,000 when the machinery is all installed and the remodeling completed.

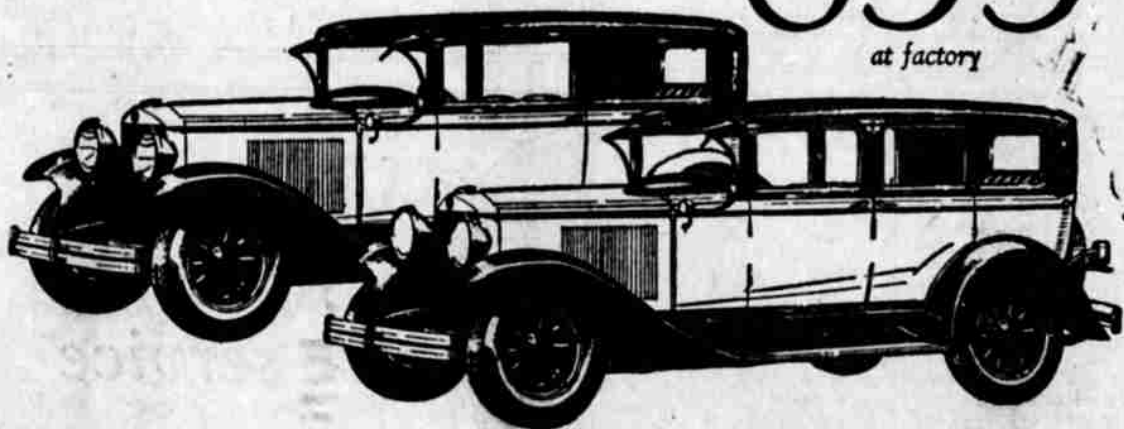
