

## MILLS ANSWER U. S. CHARGES

**Deny That Misrepresentation Used in Selling Products**

ALTURA, Cal., June 19.—Following a citation issued by the Federal trade commission in which 47 producers of pine lumber in California and Oregon have been charged with misrepresenting their product in selling it as "California white pine," instead of yellow pine, a statement has been issued by the Pickering Lumber company and the Red River Lumber company in which "misrepresentation" is denied.

The statement is as follows: "White pine and yellow pine are two general family names used by the trade and botanists to designate a large number of species of the pine family. In general the yellow pines are hard and heavy and white pines soft and light. The wood of the California tree, the 'California white pine,' has been sold under that name for a period of fifty years or longer and is well known to the trade under that designation.

"Some of the mills handling the eastern white pine have registered a complaint before the commission that this is technically not a white pine. The argument is really one between the lumbermen themselves on a technicality."

The statement also deplores the "wrong impression" given the public by the issuance of the citation by the federal commission.

The companies which have been cited lately includes several of the Klamath companies and one at Dorris, Calif.

Lumbermen say that the fight over the named has raged for a number of years and that great importance is attached to the name "white pine" by the lumber trade. The California sugar pine is said to be of the white pine species, while the California white pine, it is claimed is really yellow pine species. It is technically known as pine ponderosa, and the firms cited are chiefly producers of this species which is marketed under the white pine name.

Dispatches from Washington indicate that the case, while in the nature of a federal prosecution, is an effort on the part of the commission to reconcile the differences between various sections in the use of trade terms applied to the lumber industry. The white pine has a large eastern production while in the west the yellow species predominates and the white variety is more limited. Western producers advertise their product as "California white pine" very extensively in placing it on the markets of the country.

## COW TESTING MEETING, PLAN

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handling of dairy cows. He visits each herd once a month, weighs the morning and evening milk, takes the testing samples, and does the testing. It makes out the complete record of the cow's production, giving pounds of milk, percent test, pounds of butterfat, cost of feed, and makes suggestions relative to changes in feeding, so that production might be improved. At the end of the year a complete record is obtained of each animal in the herd, showing whether or not she was kept at a profit or loss for the year. This enables the dairyman to weed out the non-productive cows and keep those that are paying their way. Wherever associations have been formed it has resulted in increased production of the herds, thereby providing a greater net profit. Cost of this work is born by the association members, generally on the basis of so much per head per year.

"If a sufficient number of dairymen at this time desire to go ahead with the association, it will be formed at this meeting and immediate steps taken for starting testing work."

"I hope," he added, "that during the recess senators will give serious consideration to these killings so that some recommendations may be made."
