HARVEST RAINS BRING UPTURN IN QUOTATIONS

CHICAGO, June 20, (AP)—Unwelcome rains in the Harvest Unwelcome rains in the harvest region southwest led to increased buying and to early upturns of wheat prices today. There were also advices that considerable Kansas wheat had gone back 20 percent and in lowlands would be a complete loss. Opening the same as yesterday's finish to 3-4c higher, wheat afterward scored material gains all around, corn, oats and provisions were likewise firmer. With corn starting 1-8c off and 3-8c up and subsequently showing a general advance.
