

LENHART OUT TO GIVE GENE FIRST DEFEAT

All Fighters are in Fine Condition for Friday Night Fight

Rounding into the best shape of his career, Denny Lenhart, the Ukiah ex-heavyweight champion, was in tip-top condition for his main event fight tomorrow night against Gene O'Grady, Ashland fighter, who has yet to taste defeat.

Both boys will tip the beams of exactly 172 pounds.

While realizing O'Grady's ability, Lenhart is quite confident of beating the Rogue Valley Irishman.

Johnny Spencer will mix with Eddie Eddleman in the six-round semi-windup. The Seattle boy is touted as a championship prospect after defeating such boys as Johnny Casebeer, Johnny Woods and others just as good.

Eddleman is a hard hitting little southpaw battler and should give Spencer plenty of trouble.

O'Grady has been training hard after suffering with an injured hand. The Ashland boy has never lost a bout and in fighting Salior Lenhart he stands a good chance of having his record spoiled.

Lenhart is training hard and his record of 31 wins in 33 fights promises a lively mix.

Frankie Monroe and Mabe Rymers will start in the six-round special event. Monroe took a hair-line decision on the last card and this bout is expected to show the real winner.

Two four-round bouts will complete the card. Jack Lewis will meet a tough boy in Billy Robinson in one bout and Shrimp McDonald will open the show against Buddy Randall.

Tickets for the card are on sale at the Mecca Billiard Parlor.

E. McMillan, came to Klamath Falls from Bly yesterday. They brought in a truck for repair work.

At Hearty they picked up Parkinson who has been doing carpentry work in the reservation community.

After they arrived in Klamath Falls John McMillan and Parkinson left R. E. McMillan. Before they separated, they made arrangements to meet at the carnival grounds, south of the city limits.

R. E. McMillan appeared at the carnival and so did the others; apparently, however, they failed to locate each other in the crowds.

John McMillan and Parkinson apparently decided not to return to their respective dwellings in eastern Klamath today; instead, they drove to camp ground about

2 a. m. to sleep several hours until day break.

The accident was investigated by County Coroner Earl Whitlock and Deputy County Coroner Henry Joyaux.

"The young men never knew what happened to them," Mr. Whitlock said. "They simply became drowsy and sank into a deep, deep sleep from which they never awakened. We don't know whether the boys were awake when the noxious fumes first began to take effect, but it was apparent they had at least prepared themselves for sleep."

A tragic sidelight is the fact that R. E. McMillan passed the camp grounds early this morning on his way home just about the time his brother and his companion were being overcome by the gas fumes.

John McMillan is survived by his mother, Mrs. Jessie Wilson of Bly; four brothers, Donald Ross, Ralph E. and Merle of Bly and Russell of Wendell, Ida; and one sister, Mrs. Anna Lowes of Gooding, Ida. Parkinson is a native of Texas. Relatives of the young men have been notified of his death.

The remains of both young men are at the Earl Whitlock funeral home.

the man closely.

He held to his story of innocence until the officers discovered blood and reddish hair from the calves in the rear of his car. Whereupon he broke down and made a complete confession. He told of how he had killed the calves, loaded them into his car, butchered them and then brought them on into Klamath Falls where he managed to sell them to a local butcher shop for 16 cents a pound.

He showed the officers where he had hidden the heads and feet of the animals and, in fact, after having once decided to confess, answered all questions readily.

"What happened to Gober, is what will happen to several other cattle thieves," Sheriff Low remarked grimly this noon. "We've got their number now, and further arrests will follow."

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
