WORLD CHAMP AT LOCAL NAT

Lee Fourier, world's champion woman's endurance swimmer, has arrived in Klamath Falls and is now working out daily in the tank at the Klamath Natatorium in preparation for a try to break her own record.

Her present record of 56 hours, 13 minutes and 13 seconds of continuous swimming was made in August 1928 at Colton, Calif. Starting on July 17 she will make an attempt to better her own mark as a feature of the water sports program of the State Elks' convention.

She has issued a challenge to any man or woman who wishes to compete with her to enter the swim. The Elks' committee will offer prizes and trophies for the winners and runners up in the event.

At the same time but in an amateur swim Muriel Gordon, 15-year-old Colton, Calif., girl attempt to better her own mark of 16 hours in her class. She expects to swim at least 24 hours during the convention here.

Her event will be open to all amateurs who wish to try to break her record. Trophies will be awarded in this event. Miss Gordon is also working out daily in the tank at the Klamath Natatorium.

Information has been received here that Blanche Robinson, Burns, may be here to challenge Mrs. Fourier.

"The more the merrier," Mrs. Fourier says, "and I'd like to have some men enter and try to outswim me."

wounding of a restaurant owner and a policeman.

The latest outlary attributed to "Baby Face" started last night when a gunman supposedly intending robbery entered the restaurant of Milton Vaisouopolis on the south side. As Vaisouopolis approached him, the desperado whipped out two pistols and fired. Vaisouopolis wounded, stumbled forward and grappled with his assailant, as a customer seized him from the back. When the customer went out to seek a policeman, the gunman wrenched himself free and fled, pausing in the doorway to fire several more shots at Vaisouopolis. The latter may die, doctors said.

Reaching the street, the gunman jumped into an automobile stopped by traffic lights, forced the driver to get out, and sped away.

An hour later a man answering Dody's description entered the drug store of George Denbo on the northwest side and stole \$35.

When Denbo tried to parley with the man, the latter replied, "no back talk I just shot up a joint on the south side and I'm in a hurry. I've killed a couple like you and don't want to knock off any more."

As the robber sped away, Denbo ran out and called to Police Sergeant Clarence Falk, who was with his motorcycle across the street. Falk passed the car within a mile.

"I surrender," the fugitive announced, stepping out of the car at Falk's command.

As the policeman fumbled with his holster, the gunman whipped out a pistol, struck Falk over the left ear with its butt and fired two shots, one of which struck Falk in the back.

The car later was found abandoned.

Several picked squads of police and a special squad of federal agents, have been assigned exclusively to search for Dody.
