

# WOOL PRICES FAVOR BUYER

## Quotations Far From Satisfactory for Grower Says Report

BOSTON, June 21. (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say:

"More inquiry is reported for wool this week, but sales are far from satisfactory, especially on the finer qualities, which favor the buyer in price. Medium wools are fairly firm.

"Operations in the new clip have lessened in consequence of reduced limits. Some wool, however, is being bought in the clean range of 85-88 cents, as against 85-92 cents formerly for fine and fine medium wools.

"The manufacturing positions is not unhealthy but it continues slow so far as new business is concerned. Were prices better stabilized in wool it is possible business might be better in tops, yarns and piece goods.

"Foreign markets are dull in favor of the buyer.

"Mohair is rather quiet but prices keep fairly firm."

Oregon: Fine and F. M. Staple, 94-95c; fine and F. M. Fr. clothing, 92-93c; fine and F. M. clothing, 90c; Valley No. 1, 90-92c.

Mohair: Original bag, average 12 months Oregon, 58-60c.

Graded stock: First combing, 45-70c; good carding, 45-50c.

## SALE OF WOOL IS MODERATE

BOSTON, June 21. (AP)—Sales of moderate quantities have been made on a number of lines of graded western wools. Bulk of sales reported were in 45-50 and 55's strictly combing wools. Quotations are about steady on both of these grades. The prices reported on 48-50 grades were in range of 78 to 80c, secured basis and 56 grade brought 88 to 90c, secured basis.

## FORTUNE HELP MOVEMENT OF BIRTH CONTROL

FORTUNE 14 INS.—CLEVELAND, June 21. (UP)—Millions of dollars for the spread of birth control information, was provided in the will of Charles F. Brush, inventor, filed for probate today.

The exact amount of Brush's estate is not known, but he was a multi-millionaire.

After leaving \$100,000 to a church, his old mansion to his daughter and choice art works to the Cleveland Art Museum, Brush willed most of the remainder of his estate to the Brush Foundation. His foundation established 18 months ago, is for the spread and stabilization of birth control. A storm of protest followed its inauguration.

## TAILSPIN AIR CRASH FATAL TO 2 FLYERS

PITTSBURGH, Pa., June 21. (AP)—Going into a tailspin at an altitude of about 2000 feet, an army primary training plane crashed at Rodgers Field here yesterday and Captain Wm. J. Snyder, 24, pilot, and first class private Harry C. La Frenz, 29, regular army mechanic attached to Rodgers Field, were killed.

Cause of the crash still was undetermined today. Field attendants watching the plane said they saw La Frenz start opening his parachute, but that he failed to jump.

Snyder, member of the 124th observation squadron, was a native of Pittsburgh. La Frenz, who came to the field only 10 days ago, after serving in Panama, resided in New York.

## KLAMATH MEN INTERESTED IN MINE PROJECT

YREKA, Cal., June 21. (AP)—Inauguration of the mining of crystalline quartz and sand glass bearing ore in Siskiyou county was indicated here yesterday with the filing of fourteen placer claims in the Red Rock country near the Oregon state line. The claims were filed by G. L. Christy, of Klamath Falls, and associates.

Thirty five notices of location of quartz and placer mines in Siskiyou county were filed today. The claims were filed for gold mining locations.
