"Killing transgressors of the Volstead act without fair trial is unchristian, un-American, and uncivilized. Such unlawful killings are equal to murder. LISBON, Portugal, June 22. (AP)—Major Ramon Franco, Spanish trans-Atlantic flier and his three companions arrived at the Azores this morning from Cartagena, Spain, and will leave for New York tomorrow afternoon.

BREAK GROUND FOR FACTORY

Ground has been broken for the construction of the Langell Valley cheese factory—sponsored by the Langell Valley Community club—and within a few days material for the plant will be on the ground, according to Mrs. May Gale, Langell Valley, one of the stockholders. The cheese factory has been incorporated for \$6,000, forty shares of stock have been sold and there are 32 shareholders. The project was conceived and sponsored by the Community club. Through an error, it was originally reported that the association was fostered by the Langell Valley grange. The factory is expected to be in operation within 60 days.

RECONCILIATION IS SOUGHT BY NORMAN KERRY

NEW YORK, June 22. (AP)—Aboard the liner Majestic enroute to Europe today was Norman Kerry, motion picture actor, without ticket, passport or baggage, in an attempt to effect a reconciliation with his divorced wife. Mrs. Kerry sailed aboard the ship to visit their 12-year old daughter in a London school. Kerry, arriving as the liner was about to sail, was prevented from ascending the gang-plank but boarded the ship astride a wardrobe trunk on an escalator which conveys luggage into the hold. The presence aboard the ship of her husband came as a surprise to Mrs. Kerry who shortly before the ship sailed said she did not expect to see him. She declared a reconciliation was possible, "but only possible."

stationed a man at the hand wheel.

"You did none of these things," Inspector Edthofer is an old time sea captain.

A report of Captain Johnson's testimony will be forwarded to the department of commerce at Washington, D. C.

Captain Johnson was taken off the wrecked Laurel Wednesday by coast guardsmen after he had refused to leave on Monday when the last of the crew was removed. The Laurel broke completely in two after having been pounded unmercifully by tremendous seas.

Captain Johnson and members of the crew testified that there were only two men on watch besides the master and second mate when the Laurel suddenly failed to respond to the rudder.

"I sent the first and second mates back to look the engine over," Johnson testified, "but they reported they found nothing wrong."

"And how long was it from that time until the Laurel went aground," Inspector Edthofer asked.

The Captain was unable to answer. Previous testimony revealed that the time in question was 45 minutes.

There were many other questions to which the master of the ill-fated freighter was unable to respond. Often he merely hung his head and bit his lips. Once tears were plainly visible in his eyes.

"Did you know the condition of the anchor when you crossed out?" Edthofer asked.

Johnson shook his head in negation.

"Why didn't you?"

"That's the first mate's business."

"But," the inspector declared, "The mate has told us that the anchor was ready for sea; that it was not in position to drop hurriedly should the emergency arise. Did you know that?"

Again Johnson shook his head. "You should have," the inspector declared.
