KLAMATH DAIRYMEN TO FORM COW TESTING ASSOCIATION TODAY

A meeting of all dairymen who
are interested in forming an as-
sociation for cow testing has
been called for this afternoon at
1:30 p.m. at the chamber of
commerce.

The association will be formed
at this meeting and immedi-
ate steps will be taken for start-
ing testing work. The promi-
nent dairymen of the Klamath
basin will be at the meeting and
will give their reasons why such
an organization should be formed.
Sentiment for such an as-
sociation has been increasing for
the past years and it is felt that
it will be of considerable bene-
fit to the dairy industry of the
Klamath basin, according to C.
A. Henderson, county agent.

In brief the plan of a cow
testing association is that from
26 to 30 dairymen get together
and form the organization which
will comprise the stock of the
farms. The organization will
hire a tester who is competent,
and well acquainted with the
feeding and handling of cattle.
He will visit each herd once a
month, taking samples of the
milk which has been previously
weighed, and the product will be
tested for butterfat. At the end
of a year a complete record will
be had of each cow and whether
or not the farmer has been op-
erating at a profit.

Cost of this work will be borne
by the association members, prob-
ably on the basis of so much per
head per year. All those inter-
ested are asked to attend the
meeting.

Mexican Religious Rows Stopped By Joint Accord

MEXICO CITY, June 21 (UP)—
The Mexican religious prob-
lem, which has resulted in wide-
spread con-jury and blood-
shed, has resulted in an accord
between the government and re-
presentatives of the Holy See at
Rome.

The government and church
representatives today issued a
statement.

The statement, signed by Pre-
sident Portes Gil and Archbishop
Leonold y Flores, announced that
the government promises juris-
diction "within the law, in the
exercise of spiritual offices."

The government agrees that
it will not require priests to
register; that religious instruc-
tion may be permitted within
the churches; that the govern-
ment will consider any amend-
ments to the constitution for
which Catholics, as citizens of
the republic, have a right to
make.

The archbishop, who has acted
as representative of the Holy
See, said he hopes "the renewal
of services will lead the Mexican
people to an animated spirit of
good will to cooperate with all
moral efforts for the benefit of
the fatherland."

MEXICO CITY, June 21 (UP)—
All Catholic prisoners in Mex-
ico City jails who are held for
religious offenses have been or-
dered liberated, the interior de-
partment announced tonight.

Among those freed will be the
prominent priest, Father Modesto
Chavez Pulido.
