E. C. Wright of Compton, California is here for a stay of several days. Mr. Wright enjoyed the trip by motor and is enjoying the Klamath country.

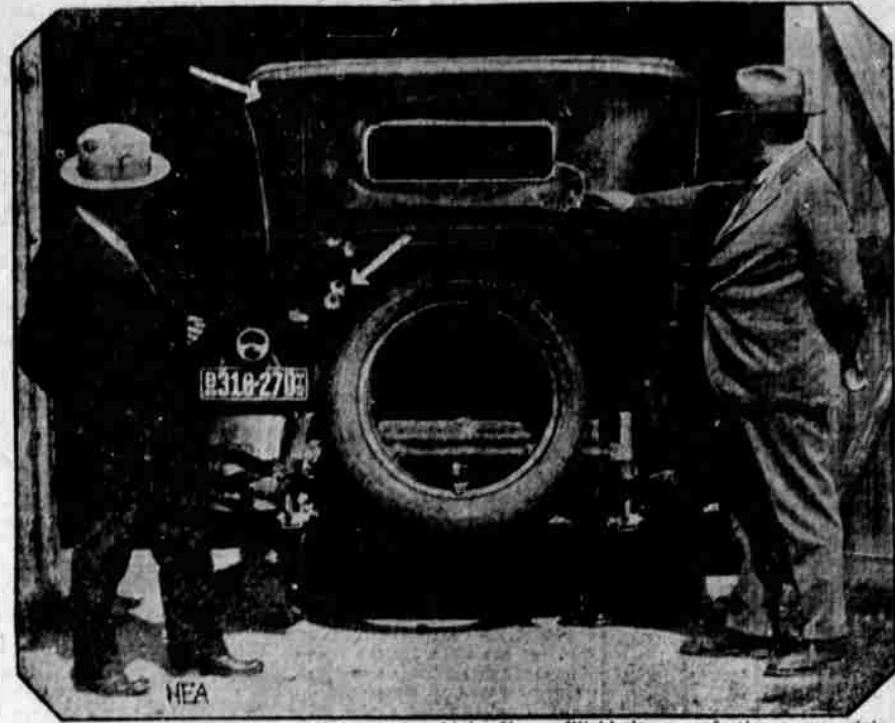
Dr. Bullard Here—

RAIN REPORTS BRING DROP IN WHEAT PRICES

CHICAGO, June 26, (AP)—Reports of beneficial rains in Canadian drought sections led to early downturns in wheat values today. Rallies ensued, however, at times as a result of advices of continued excessive dryness south of the Canadian boundary and of considerable export business overnight. Opening at 1 cent to 1 3/4 cent setback wheat afterwards recovered much of the loss.

What a Dry Agent's Buckshot Did



Shown above is the bullet-riddled auto in which Henry Wirkkula, a confectioner, was slain by a charge of buckshot fired by Emmett J. White, a 24-year-old U. S. customs patrolman, on a dark road near International Falls, Minn. Wirkkula died at the wheel, the position of the car indicating that he was trying to stop after customs officers had hailed him, believing the auto contained liquor from Canada. His two small children on the back seat escaped death because they were asleep and were lying down, the buckshot passing over them. No liquor was found in the car by the officers, who say White was aiming at the tires.

SPUD GRADING DISCUSSED BY ASSOCIATION

One Resolution Adopted, Other Tabled Pending Further Information.

At a meeting of the Klamath Potato Growers association held at Henley Monday evening, the association adopted a resolution urging the state market agent to cooperate with the federal inspection service in securing only federal inspection service for all Oregon potatoes.

A resolution proposed by an association recommending that all potatoes in Oregon be marketed on the basis of United States grades; also permitting sale of any combination grades on the percentage of United States number ones contained therein, was tabled by the association. C. A. Henderson, secretary, was instructed to secure additional data and to call another meeting of the association to further consider this resolution.

Purpose of the association meeting was to adopt association resolutions which will be submitted at a hearing before the state market agent in Klamath Falls on July 20. This hearing will be held to hear arguments concerning the establishment of a uniform potato grading system in Oregon.

Bureau Has No Intention of Using Schools To Disseminate Information About Prohibition

WASHINGTON, June 26, (AP)—Suggestions that the public school system was to be used by the prohibition bureau for dissemination of enforcement propaganda have brought an emphatic denial of any such intent from the treasury department.

The denial of the "wrong impression," as Prohibition Commissioner Doran described it, followed swiftly on the publication of a pamphlet containing suggestions for the incorporation of prohibition information in eight school study subjects. Together with slogans supporting prohibition and admonitions to teachers to help toward enforcement.

The pamphlet was made public by Anna B. Sutter, director of the statistical and educational division of the bureau, with the explanation that she would display her proposed course of study, entitled "How Shall We Teach the Eighteenth Amendment?" in a booth at the meeting of the National Education association in Atlanta, June 28 to July 3.

"The Treasury Department does not intend to make suggestions to school authorities or to attempt to use the schools as a propaganda medium," Commissioner Doran declared, explaining "the public school system is operated under the control and authority of the several state governments and the curriculum in the schools is not subject to control of the federal government."

"Many of the states have laws requiring that the effects of alcohol and narcotics on the human system be taught in the public schools," the commissioner went on. "The bureau of prohibition has prepared a limited number of pamphlets which contain accurate information on these subjects as well as the economic phases of prohibition, and they are available should they be desired."

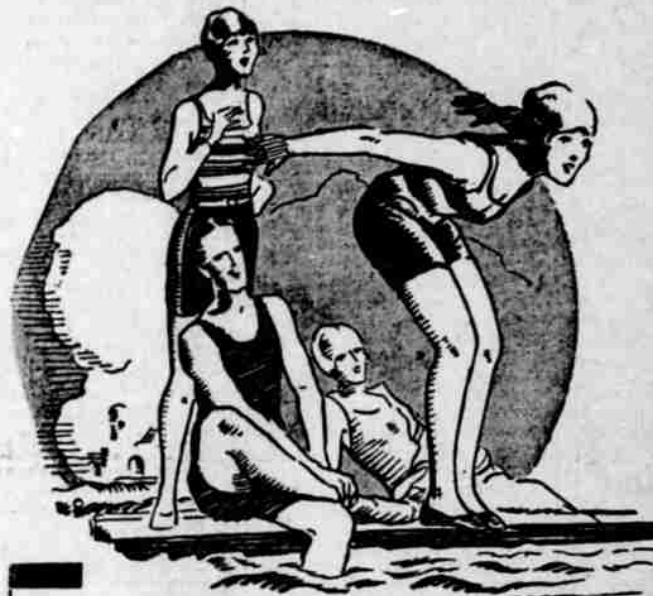
