SCHMELING TO UNDERGO ACID TEST TONIGHT

If Maxie Can Kayo Uzcudun, He is of Championship Material.

 NEW YORK, June 27. (AP)—A heavyweight man of destiny may rise tonight in the ring at the Yankee Stadium in answer to the call of the fight faithful for another flashing, punching world champion.

A mantle of greatness has hovered over Max Schmeling, young belting beauty from Germany, ever since he caught up with Johnny Risko, lashed out twice with his right hand and slattered the Cleveland rubber man's reputation for durability. Tonight a bigger and better trained Schmeling will attempt to do the same thing in 15 rounds to Paulino Uzcudun.

Huge Crowd Expected
 The squat man from the Basque country, almost as broad as he is tall and hitherto punch proof as a block of steel, will furnish the final test of Schmeling's ability before a crowd of about 45,000 in the American league ball yard. The faithful are expected to pay more than \$500,000 to sit in on the experiment, with most of the proceeds donated to the Milk Fund for needy children.

In his sensational rise to the front ranks of the heavyweights contenders, the German bomber has displayed all the punching power, skill and ferocity that goes to make a champion. His knifing right hand bounced Risko to the floor and kept him there, something that no other heavyweight of the present era had been able to do.

Not His Hard
 But in his short American campaign, one test has been lacking. At no time has "Der Maxie" been hit solidly and hurt. At no time has he been belted in the body until the skin bloomed and then turned purple. Max has yet to stand that test before the critical eyes of the faithful and come back to weather the storm and crush his foe.

Of all the contenders for the heavyweight crown Gene Tunney relinquished last summer, Paulino Uzcudun seems most fitted to bring out all the strength and possible weaknesses in Schmeling's fighting equipment. He has a body as staunch as the osken timbers he once hewed in the snow Pyrenees, experience, unlimited courage, and a rushing, rough-house attack that never falters no matter how fearful the shellings about his own head.

The big German not only looks like Jack Dempsey but is said to fight like him and he may be the coming champion. The heavyweight division is badly shot and Schmeling may clear the atmosphere tonight.

As my old friend Sid Mercer says, "Schmeling is possessed of the same nervous restlessness that has always been characteristic of Dempsey. He never remains long in one place. One minute he is talking to you and then he disappears. He cannot sit still for more than five minutes."

I have observed this characteristic in most star athletes in various branches of sports. Babe Ruth possesses it to a great degree. I have never seen him sit down in a chair and relax. Tilden is the same.

PHILADELPHIA TAKE FOURTH STRAIGHT GAME

Lead Now Ten and One-Half Games; Yankees Divide Pair.

 The lead of the Athletics seems to grow almost by magic, but National league contenders continue to butt their heads against one another, with no particular gain for anybody. While the Pirates were losing and the Giants winning in John Heydler's circuit yesterday, the Mackmen were cleaning up their fourth straight from the defenseless Red Sox and the Yankees were dividing a pair at Washington.

These antics combined to place the Athletics at a point ten and one-half games in advance of the champions, which is no fit state of affairs if you ask the business managers.

Gets 13th
 Babe Ruth rapped Fred Marberry for his 13th home run in the fifth-round of the opener with Gehrig on base, and Lazzeri and Mousel made brave ges-

tures against Lloyd Brown with a homer apiece in the final round of the nightcap, just failing to tie the score.

The Athletics varied their program somewhat by playing a close one with the Red Sox. The Bostonians, as a matter of fact, outbit the Mack men by 11 to 8, but the leaders cashed in on runs by 6 to 5. Milton Gaston pitched another good game.

The Browns defeated Cleveland by 6 to 2, and entered a virtual tie with the Yankees for second place.

The Giants finally pulled one game from the Brooklyn fire, after the Robins had taken three in the series.

A five-run assault upon Remy Kremer in the sixth enabled the Reds to defeat the Pirates by 6 to 4, and since the Cubs and the Cardinals were not scheduled to play, all first division hands gained on the Buccaneers.
