to the corrupt practices act in the state of Oregon.

Some Want Park
Voters who have expressed themselves in favor of taking the cash-property settlement almost invariably have expressed themselves as favoring the entire tract for park and municipal purposes.

And then, too there is an element for keeping the bonds as they are. Advocates of this argue that the Strahorn (O. C. & E.) is in good shape; that it is being made a good railroad; that it will for the next twenty years supply this city's industrial section with logs and carry out all the lumber and live stock of the interior country. For these reasons they believe the bonds are good and safe and even though they bear no stipulated rate of interest, they favor holding them.

A few citizens favor rejecting all the offers, keeping the bonds and starting suit in the courts to make the Southern Pacific and Great Northern railroads pay in full every cent of the bonds and interest that has been paid by the city.

G. C. Brower in a communication asks if the \$150,000 cash is accepted can it be applied on the \$300,000 Klamath Falls municipal bonds as payment. He states that these bonds are not due and they cannot be paid, nor can any portion of them be paid until due. He wants to know what assurance the people have that one-half of the \$300,000 city general bonds can or will be paid.

In reply to Mr. Brower's question the answer is plain: The mayor and city council have stated what money is received on this settlement will be placed in the general bond fund, which means that it will be used to retire city indebtedness. It matters not what bonds are paid with the money provided \$150,000 of the city's debts which are bearing six per cent interest are paid. The result is the same and no one could question that.

J. B. Ferguson again asks some questions in a communication. He attacks Captain Siemen's statement about title to the land, stating the government in purchasing the federal building site on the Strahorn property proves the title. He also wants to know why Seventh street is not opened from Oak to Elm street, and then he answers his own question by saying that one and one-half blocks belong to the railroads. He then advocates taking back the property so the city can proceed to put that street in passable condition.

The city has some very far reaching rights and one of them is to open streets regardless of property ownership and Mr. Ferguson might have the city council open the street named regardless of who owns the property.

In closing his communication Mr. Ferguson says with considerable ground for his statement: "What a joke it must be to visitors from progressive cities to find upon their arrival here, no city park, no place for summer evening band concerts, no children's playground."

With these and other expressions, which have already been given to the public the voters will go to the polls Friday to vote on:

First, shall the city dispose of the Strahorn income bonds amounting to \$300,000 for which the city owes \$300,000 in interest bearing bonds which were used to purchase the Strahorn bonds with no stipulated interest earning power?

Second, shall the city accept \$150,000 in cash from the O. C. & E. for this \$300,000 income bond issue?

Third, shall the city accept \$50,000 in cash and the Strahorn property on Seventh street for the \$30,000 income bonds—the federal building site bringing \$23,100 which increases the cash that amount and takes out of the real estate one entire block of ground?

LONDON, June 27, (AP)—The revolt of Ambassador Dawes against the knee breeches custom has inspired much comment in London.

"There is another perplexing problem for the Lord Chamberlain's department," says the Star. "General Dawes, the new American ambassador, refused to wear knee breeches at court. He appeared in fact at last night's court in ordinary evening dress with trousers which is the American national official costume, although other members of his embassy staff wore knee breeches which British court custom requires."

"We think General Dawes was probably right. At Rome one does as Rome does, within limits, but we see no reason why an American diplomat should change the costume in which he would wait upon his own president for the fancy dress of the country to which he is accredited. dict. Court room gossip had the division in the last few hours, 11 to one for conviction. The jury recommended "mercy in its verdict."

Superior Judge Crosby of Navajo county, who presided at the trial sentenced Black to a term of nine to 10 years in the state penitentiary and then suspended the sentence and made Black a free man.

Editorial comment on the action taken by Judge Crosby in the Winslow Daily Mail follows:

"The Winslow Daily Mail does not pretend to sit in judgement upon James Black; neither does it pose as being qualified to pass upon rulings handed down from the superior bench, but it is obvious to the layman that the 12 men who returned the manslaughter verdict against James Black, the majority believed that he should serve some time in the state prison. When that compromise verdict of manslaughter in a murder trial was agreed upon, the majority of the jurors expected that Black would be sent to 'Jolene.' Otherwise the jury would have acquitted James Black; it would not have placed the stain of a conviction upon his name, if he was never to serve a day in the penitentiary for the crime of which he was found guilty."

Letters From the People

Editor Evening Herald, Klamath Falls, Oregon.

Dear Sir:

Here are few facts that should be placed before the voters of the city before they go to the polls to vote on the sale of the O. C. & E. Bonds.

1. The city can not retire \$150,000 worth of the Bonds upon receipt of the money (if they get it), because these bonds do not mature at this time. \$15,000 matured in 1928 and have been redeemed; another \$15,000 matured in 1932, another \$15,000 in 1937, another \$15,000 in 1942 and the balance in 1947.

2. Here is a copy of Section 1 Ordinance 1093, passed by the Common Council.

Section 11.

"Inasmuch as the Common Council has called for bids for the sale of said bonds, for the interest of said bonds, the Council from the sale thereof in the construction of sanitary improvements in the City of Klamath Falls, such as sewers and other sanitary improvements, and inasmuch as the Oregon, California & Eastern Railway Company, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of Oregon, has offered bids for said bonds, and read: will, and able to proceed with said sale upon approval by the Council, of the City, and inasmuch as the City is in need of such money for the aforesaid purposes, the Council that an emergency exists and this Ordinance shall take effect as if it were in force from and after its passage and approval by the Mayor; therefore, this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force after a three-fourths vote and approval of the Mayor."

3. So evidently, it was never the intention to put this money into the General Obligation Bond Sinking Fund, or to retire the \$150,000 worth of bonds, as intimated.

SCHOOL WORK IS HASTENED

a cottage of similar type at Crescent.

The \$20,000 construction project in Malin has been held up by a shortage of brick. However work has been renewed on the unit, which includes new plumbing fixtures, and three new school rooms.

Janitor's quarters in the \$12,000 Merrill job have been completed, and work is going on towards the rearrangement of rooms, whereby additional class rooms will be available.

The new four-room grade school at Henley, for which \$16,000 was allotted, will be completed within several weeks. The school will be of brick veneer.

The roofing is on the two-room addition and basement of the Chilquien school. This project, on which will be spent approximately \$14,000, includes new plumbing fixtures.

The four-room addition, and also auditorium which will be added onto the Altamont school, is well under way. The roof is finished and the plasterers will take charge next week. Cost of this unit will be in the neighborhood of \$20,000.

The roof on the new six-room Weyerhaeuser school is being constructed and the building will be ready for plasterers next week. Cost of improvement will be in the neighborhood of \$27,000.
