Undeclared Rogue River Valley Boy Faces Biggest Scrap in Career.

After his fight with Deany Lenhart, Gene O'Grady, hard hitting light heavyweight of Ashland, went to Tex Bickerstaff, matchmaker, and begged to be allowed to fight the toughest boy of his weight in the northwest.

UZGUDUN TAKES BEATING FROM GERMAN HEAVY

Max Schmeling Has Spaniard Nearly Out on His Feet in Last Rounds.

(By ALLAN J. GOULD) (Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, June 28. (AP)—Just before the start of the 15th and last round of the slugfest between Max Schmeling and Uzcudun, Referee Arthur Donovan looked anxiously at the bloody battered face of the Spaniard and asked:

Gets Decision Schmeling received the unanimous decision of Referee Arthur Donovan and the two judges. From the tenth round on there was no question of the result. Pirates Beat Cincinnati and Cubs Shade Cardinals.

The Athletics increased their lead over the champion Yankees to eleven and one-half engagements by defeating the Huguenots, 6 to 3, in the opener of a three-game series at Philadelphia yesterday.

While all of this was going on in the Barnard league the Pirates were winning from Cincinnati, 5 to 3; and the Cubs were shading the Cardinals, 5 to 4. Safe from the reach of the Robins, the giants had a pleasant afternoon against their cousins, the Phillies, whom they defeated by 3 to 3 for the eleventh time in twelve starts.

Sammy Gray resigned in favor of a pinch batsman just too soon to get credit for the Browns' Garbino finish against Al Thomas in Chicago. George Blaholder got the benefit of home runs by Mannish and Mellie in the ninth.

Rogers Hornsby continued the Cub streak against the Cardinals by rapping Clarence Mitchell for a home run in the eighth with the score tied at 4 to 4.

The victory continued the Cubs in second place, one small game behind the Pirates, and dropped the Cardinals into a tie with the Giants, three contests from the lead.

Brooklyn rallied to nose out the Braves by 3 to 5, with Win Ballou doing some fine relief pitching.

Schmeling, Paolino Fight Blow By Blow

ROUND ONE—Schmeling jabbed lightly with his left to the face. Paolino covered up and then sent both fists to the body lightly. Schmeling landed a hard right to the head and jabbed twice to the face.

ROUND TWO—They clinched and traded body blows. Max tapped to head twice. The Basque was having trouble getting with his short arms.

ROUND THREE—Schmeling put over a dozen light lefts to face. Schmeling stabbed hard left to jab his left to face.

ROUND FOUR—Schmeling hooked left to chin and three light lefts to face. He was short with both fists.

ROUND FIVE—Schmeling landed lightly to face three times. Paolino drove him to ropes with body blows.

ROUND SIX—Schmeling led a left but was short. Paolino landed both fists to body.

ROUND SEVEN—Coming out of clinch they traded punches. Max had slight edge. Paolino backed Max to ropes and put both fists to body.

ROUND EIGHT—Schmeling in wonderful condition as he came out, while Paolino appeared a bit tired. Paolino rushed in with both fists, making Max back away.

ROUND NINE—Paolino rushed and landed two blows to body. He then hurt German with left to stomach.

ROUND TEN—Schmeling went into clinch. Paolino pumped both fists to body and made German retreat to ropes.
