

GERMAN KAISER COULD RETURN TO HOMELAND

Failure of Bill to Pass Opens Nation to For- mer Monarch.

BERLIN, June 28. (UP)—A government manifesto, denying absolutely that Germany bears "sole guilt" for the World War and signed by President Paul von Hindenburg and members of the cabinet, was issued last night in connection with the tenth anniversary of the signing of the Versailles peace treaty.

The manifesto condemned terms of the Versailles treaty and was made public in connection with the great demonstration in that the "war guilt lie" planned in various German cities for the anniversary observance Friday.

The official communiqué issued by the government for tomorrow's anniversary demonstrations, said: "Today is a day of mourning. Ten years have passed since Germany's peace negotiators compelled her to put her signature on a document which is an utter disappointment to all friends of right and of true peace."

"The treaty was a huge burden to the German people and fate dealt with the economic life which needed an extreme effort in all sections of the German people to avert the worst consequences of the Versailles treaty."

"I, therefore, the German people, very existence and jeopardized the economic equilibrium of Europe."

"Germany signed the treaty without admitting that she was the sole author of the war. This

charge is a source of constant irritation among our people and enters confidence between nations. We are confident that the whole nation agrees with us in repudiating the charge of Germany's sole guilt in the World War. The future belongs to a conception of peace not dictated by force but based on the unanimous and honest conviction of a free people having equal rights."

The country is planning demonstrations against the treaty. The demonstrations are directed at two points, both in the Versailles treaty: repudiation of the "sole guilt" for the World War on Germany and withdrawal of some 60,000 foreign troops from the Rhine valley.

WILL CONTEST INDICATED BY COURT ACTION

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28. (UP)—Possibility of a contest of the will of Simon Klarmeyer, 84, Los Angeles, was seen yesterday when Mrs. Leon Brooks, wife of the manager of the Beverly Hills hotel, appeared in superior court here.

Mrs. Brooks will receive \$100 a month for the remainder of her life from the \$90,000 estate of Klarmeyer if the 30 sisters and nephews of the deceased, named in a previous will, do not succeed in contesting the later will.

The trust fund for Mrs. Brooks was made in consideration for services rendered Klarmeyer during his illness, she testified today.

Portland Will Stage Big 4th of July Card

PORTLAND, Ore., June 28.—All roads lead to Portland July 4, when the Portland Boxing Commission will stage the greatest boxing card ever held in the Pacific Northwest. On account of its importance, with two of the leading contenders for world's light heavyweight championship honors, Joe Anderson, of Covington, Ky., and Maxie Rosenbloom, New York City, it will be held in the afternoon at the Portland Coast League baseball park, starting at 2 p. m. They will meet in the 10-round main event.

Anderson has appeared in Portland several times, and is a big favorite there. He won from Leo Lomski, has beaten Eddie Roberts, George Dixon and others of the same class. Rosenbloom is making his first trip to Portland, and is known as one of the most outstanding fighters of his weight in the country. He has met six former world's champions, Johnny Wilson, Ted (Kid) Lewis, Jack Delaney, Harry Greb, Pete Latza and Tiger Flowers. He won a decision over Anderson at Cincinnati recently and also has a decision over Lomski, obtained at Detroit two months ago. Anderson thinks he was given the worst of the verdict in the Ohio city and is anxious to even the count. It is likely that the winner of this match, which will be watched with interest by every fight fan in the nation, will be in line for a bout with the champion, Tommy Loughran.

Matchmaker Joe Levy is arranging an all star card to round out the show. He has Willie Feldman, New York middleweight and Red Uhlman, Oakland, Cal., in another 10-round go and will add two six and two

four-round matches. All of these will be between boxers of main event class.

Undoubtedly boxing fans from all over the state, and from Washington, also, will head for Portland. In order to accommodate visitors, the Portland Boxing Commission has arranged for those desiring tickets to send a certified check or money order to its office, 407 Guaranty building. The sender can either have the tickets sent to their address, if accompanied by a self-addressed stamped envelope or to the ball park office, where they can be called for the day of the bout. As a crowd of over 10,000 can be accommodated, there will be no difficulty in securing seats. Prices are \$1, \$1.50, \$2, \$3, \$4.40 and \$5.40.

SHIP WRECKED; CREW IS SAVED

known as station No. 3. As yet no definite word has been received from the department for the placing of this station.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28. (AP)—A message from coast guardsmen at Point Reyes this morning said the 12 remaining members of the crew aboard the wrecked freighter Hartwood had been taken off and that the ship was pounding to pieces on the rocks. Sixteen members of the crew were taken off shortly before midnight.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28. (AP)—White gale-lashed seas

were pounding to pieces the 200 foot lumber schooner Hartwood on the rocky coast off Point Reyes today, twenty-eight persons, including a woman and two children, were taken off the vessel by coast guardsmen in one of the most gallant sea rescues in Pacific coast history. Twelve of the imperiled crew were hauled to safety over the turbulent waves by means of the "breches buo". Sixteen others, including five passengers had been off in a surf boat several hours previously.

With the rescue of the second group, the entire personnel of the 240 ton wooden vessel had been saved from what seemed almost certain death that threatened after the Hartwood, caught in the teeth of a fierce gale and feeling its way blindly through a dense fog struck a submerged reef last night near the Point Reyes lighthouse.

The woman rescued is Mrs. Carl Enstrom, wife of the doomed vessel's captain. The children are Paul Enstrom, 6 year old son of Captain and Mrs. Enstrom and Fred Arne, 7, son of Conrad Arne, first mate.
