MASONS BUY SCHOOL PROPERTY

THREE BIDS SUBMITTED AT SESSION

Lodge Submits Two Offers, One of Which is Accepted.

COUNTY TO ASSUME ALL PAVING LIENS

Down Payment of \$1555 Will be Paid by Klamath Masonic Lodge for Klamath County High School Property; Rest at \$2000 Annually. Four Per Cent Interest.

The Klamath county high school property, comprising twelve lots on which is situated the old brick school building, was sold this afternoon to the Klamath Falls lodge of Masons, number 177, for \$15,500, by the county court which opened and considered three offers at 2 p. m. today.

The successful bid provided for a down payment of \$1555. The remainder of the money will be paid at the rate of \$2000 annually, with 4 per cent interest. The bid provides that the county would assume the payment of \$3100 in street assessments against the property.

The lodge offered an alternative bid which was refused. The bid was \$10,500 in cash with the lodge assuming the \$3100 paying lien debt.

The third bid was submitted by E. M. Bubb, who offered \$7500 in cash.

The property fronts on High, Sixth and Seventh streets, and overlooks the city's business district.

The lodge is considering using the high school building for a Masonic temple. It is possible that a portion of the property behind the school building will be offered for an armory site, and that the property fronting on High street, which has been graded for tennis courts, will be offered to the city park board.

CONTROL FIRE NEAR DORRIS

Accidental Shot Kills Well Known Physician

MARSHFIELD, June 29. (AP)—Dr. R. V. Leep, Bandon physician, was accidentally shot and killed today while hunting geese on Cape Blanco rocks near Port Orford. Dr. Leep was in party with four Portland physicians and had gone to the rocks this morning. Louis Peterson and Harry Jensen, in whose power boat the party was conveyed to the rocks, returned to Port Orford to secure a smaller craft in which they expected to place the body and return it to Port Orford.

Meager information received here indicated the five physicians had completed their hunting trip and were about to return to Marshfield by boat. Five rifles, tied together, were being hoisted into the boat when one of them was accidentally discharged. The full charge struck Dr. Leep in the breast, according to information. He died instantly.

ESPINOSA AND JONES ARE TIED

WINGED FOOT CLUB MARONECK, N. Y., June 29. (AP)—Badly off form, Bobby Jones, national amateur king, shot a 79 on his final round and tied Al Espinosa of Chicago, for the lead in the national open golf championship. Each scored 294 for the 72 holes.

Densmore Shute, young Columbus, Ohio, pro, tossed away a slim chance to enter the Jones-Espinosa tie on the home hole. There, needing a three for a 74 that would give him 294, he slashed a 250-yard drive, but his chip shot over the green. He was too strong coming back, took five for the hole, a 76 for the round and a total of 296.

Of the remaining possible contenders, only Peter O'Hara of Vernon, Pa., and George Von Elm, the Detroit amateur, had even the remotest chance of bettering the tie between Jones and Espinosa. Both needed to play sub-par golf on the last few holes to get as much as a tie with the leaders.

It appeared next to certain, however, that Jones and Espinosa would be forced to play off at 36 holes tomorrow. Jones has already participated in three open championship playoffs.

O'Hara, after 15 holes of the final round, was definitely eliminated. He needed a 71 to tie but had piled up 65 strokes with three more holes to go.

O'Hara's hopes vanished when he dropped four strokes to par on three successive holes, the 13th, 14th and 15th.

P. SCHONCHIN WILL EXPLAIN MODOC BATTLE

Peter Schonchin, the only living eye witness of the massacre of General Canby and his aides by Captain Jack and other Modoc Indian warriors, today announced he would lead caravans to the scene of the Modoc war in the lava beds.

Schonchin who is now 83 years of age, was an active young warrior at the time of the war and one of Captain Jack's trusted fighters. He was one of the stubborn little band of Indians who held off several regiments of United States soldiers for over seven months.

STORY OF CRASH IN SEA TOLD

LONDON, June 29. (AP)—The dramatic story of the harrowing adventures of the missing Spanish airmen and their rescue at dawn this morning by the British aircraft carrier Eagle, told in simple and terse language by Major Ramon Franco aboard the rescue ship today, revealed that the flyers had flown beyond the Azores and were attempting to beat their way back when they ran out of gasoline.

Late this afternoon the British admiralty received the following statement of what happened in Major Franco's own words from the eagle now speeding to Gibraltar with the four rescued airmen. The message read:

"We left Los Alcazares at 5 p. m., on June 21, passing Cape St. Vincent at 9 p. m. "From Gibraltar we were forced to gain height owing to the excessive air disturbances. "From Cape St. Vincent to the Azores was an uninterrupted lay- (Continued on Page Five)

CASH OFFER FOR BONDS ACCEPTED

City Votes to Take \$150,000 Cash for Interest in Railroad.

DEBT OF CITY WILL BE MATERIALLY CUT

Vote on Sale of O. C. & E. Railroad Bonds Comparatively Light; Decision in Favor of Acceptance of Cash Offer is Decisive.

Klamath Falls' electorate yesterday voted to sell the city's \$300,000 O. C. & E. income bonds to the O. C. & E. railroad and to accept the \$150,000 cash offer. It voted against acceptance of the alternative offer, \$50,000 in cash plus the Seventh street property of the railroad.

The money from the railroad will be placed by the city in the general bond obligation fund and will materially reduce the city's municipal debt.

Vote for the cash bid was just 11 votes shy of being two to one over the cash-property offer. Cash bid, 159.

Following is the unofficial count: Authorizing the council to sell bonds: Yes, 159; no, 129.

Authorizing sale of bonds for \$150,000 in cash: Yes, 159; no, 79.

Authorizing sale of bonds for cash and property: Yes, 100; no, 93.

The ballot was necessarily involved and apparently caused some confusion.

Hawks Establishes New Non-stop Flight Mark

ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., June 29. (AP)—His weariness forgotten in the joy of success, Captain Frank M. Hawks completed a non-stop flight from Los Angeles at 1:16:03 a. m. daylight today, establishing a one-stop round trip coast-to-coast record of 36 hours 46 minutes 48 seconds flying time.

A thousand or more persons were at the field awaiting his arrival when his plane appeared overhead. He circled the field twice and then dropped in slowly, barely skimming the trees.

After the wheels had touched the ground he speeded up the motor and taxied several hundred feet. Seeing that he was too far down the field and heading for a wire fence, he speeded up in an attempt to jump, but the plane came down straddling the fence.

Narrow Escape. Hawks clambered out of the plane smiling and appeared undisturbed by his narrow escape. "It's just too bad," he said. "One of the first to reach his (Continued on Page Five)

PLANE LOCATED SOUTHEAST OF SMALL ISLAND

Aviators Found Drifting in Seaplane 100 Miles Off Archipelago; Discovery Made at Time When Search Was About to Be Abandoned

MADRID, June 29. (AP)—All but given up for dead, Major Ramon Franco, famous Spanish aviator and three companions who started a trans-Atlantic flight to the United States by way of the Azores more than a week ago and have since been missing, today were en route to Gibraltar aboard the British airplane-carrier Eagle.

Snatched from the waters of the Atlantic at a point barely 100 miles southeast of the Island of Santa Maria on the tip of the Azores archipelago, the airmen were reported all well by the British rescue ship. Even their plane, a huge two-motored Dornier-Wal was salvaged, although slightly damaged.

First news of the rescue was given out at the Spanish ministry of state which announced it had received the word from the Spanish consul at Gibraltar. The consul's message read:

"Franco and companions picked up alive by Eagle near Azores coming Gibraltar."

It was learned that Major Francisco's seaplane was discovered by two planes sent out from the Eagle just when they were about to give up the search.

Although previous reports stated that the Spanish seaplane was only slightly damaged, latest advice indicated that it was badly wrecked.

The government sent the news to all the provinces where scenes of wild joy similar to those in Madrid took place.

News of the men's finding thrilled all Spain as it has been on few occasions. Nothing comparable to the street manifestations of joy has been known here since the end of the Moroccan war.

Gratitude to the British was expressed everywhere. A large crowd paraded to the British embassy and cheered the ambassador, Sir George Graham.

The position reported by the Eagle indicated that the Spanish airmen had either flown or drifted a considerable distance toward the island of Santa Maria after they were last definitely (Continued on Page Five)

FIRE SETTERS ARE PAROLED

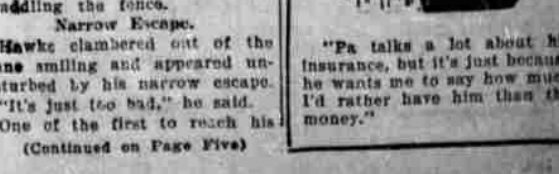
Three youths who reside near Keno were paroled to their parents this morning by County Judge F. R. Goddard, following their admission that their carelessness resulted in a serious fire in the Keno district.

The boys were ordered to write to the county court once a week and detail what they had been doing the preceding seven days.
