TUESDAY FIGHT WILL BE GENE'S GREAT CHANCE

O'Grady "Hopped Up" Over Ring Battle With K. O. White.

One of the principal reasons Gene O'Grady, husky hard hitting light heavyweight of Ashland, may upset the dope bucket Tuesday night and defeat K. O. White, sensational negro fighter, is that the Ashland boy fights his best when the dope is against him.

Take his fight against Kevin O'Carroll for example. The fans figured the amiable Irishman would pick Gene to pieces. What was the result? The Ashland boy pitched swirled out of his corner, overwhelmed the Irishman with a savage onslaught and knocked him flat and cold before the first round was two minutes old. O'Carroll never quite knew what happened. When he came to he wept bitter tears and caught the first train out of town.

Then he was the fight with Young Peter Jackson. Gene took one on the chin in the seventh round and dropped for a nine count. He came back like a whirlwind to win a draw from the Portland fighter. Dynamite Murphy caught O'Grady a sizzler on the button in the first round and the tough former boy sat down with a decided thump, but he arose and made a punching bag out of Murphy for the rest of the fight.

In Poor Shape
Gene's worst showing was his fight with Denny Lenhart, the ex-navy champ, against whom he was lucky to get a draw. But the youth had pitched several tons of hay the day before in Ashland and was not in good shape for the bout.

It is within the realm of possibility that O'Grady will smother the clever negro at the outset and if he does, his ring "rep" is made. The Ashland boy has not had the experience of White but he is fast, willing, can hit, can take'em and has that great asset of all, a fighting heart. A combination like that is likely to upset the dope bucket in any ring.

Big Timer
White who hails from Chicago and who recently fought a smashing draw with Walter Cleghorn, has fought the best of his class. He lost two decisions to Tuffy Griffiths, drew with Owen Phelps, knocked out Dixie Kid in five rounds, Snow Flake in six rounds and Tim O'Keefe in four rounds. He has beaten Red Ublan, Jock Malone, Walcott Langford four times and Bennie Kid Stanley.

Although realizing that White will be the toughest adversary he has ever met, O'Grady can hardly wait until the bell. That he did not trounce Lenhart stings deeply, and he is out to show the Klamath fans, among whom he is a favorite, that he can crash through in a pinch.

Asks For Hard Fight
"Let me go against the best man you can bring down here," he pleaded with Joe Bickerstaff, matchmaker. "I'll show these fight fans what I can do."
At first Bickerstaff was going to bring down Young Firpo but the chance to get White was too tempting, so the plans were changed.

CUBS TROUNCE CARDINALS AS GIANTS CLIMB

Series of Yankees and A's Postponed Until Next August.

A large section of the Delaware river, east into Shike Park at an inopportune moment yesterday, caused a let-up in the persecution of the Yankees by the Athletics. With 20,000 Philadelphians yelling for more of the blood of Huggins, the second game of the series was put over until August 7 when a double-header will be played.

John J. McGraw climbed into third place through remaining inactive yesterday as the Cubs obligingly defeated the Cardinals who previously were tied with the New Yorkers. The Cubs themselves rode to the crest on their 9 to 5 triumph as Cincinnati defeated Pittsburgh by 19 to 3 in the third game of the series. This combination of events gave the Bruins a virtual tie in games with the Pirates, but the McCarthy entry led because of fewer defeats.

The Senators and Red Sox offered the only action in the eastern half of the American league, the Bostonese winning by 5 to 2, but all of the western clubs took the field. Alvin Crowder pitched the Browns to a 7 to 2 breeze over the White Sox in Chicago, and Cleveland shined George Uhle and the Tigers by 5 to 4 at Detroit.

Hold Up Purse of C. Belanger, 'Ace' Hudkins

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29, (AP)—On the ground that the fight between "Ace" Hudkins, Nebraska Wildcat, and Charley Belanger, French-Canadian light heavyweight, had "faked bad," Joe Genshies, secretary of the state boxing commission, held up the purse. Amounting to about \$20,000, here last night, Genshies announced the withholding of the purse shortly after the ending of the bout, which resulted in a decision for Hudkins.

Fight fans buried their programs and other papers into the ring to show their disapproval of the brand of boxing exhibited and most of the sports writers agreed that it "certainly did look bad."

Genshies, who said he had acted upon the orders of William Hanlon, state boxing commissioner, announced that an investigation would be held, probably next Tuesday.

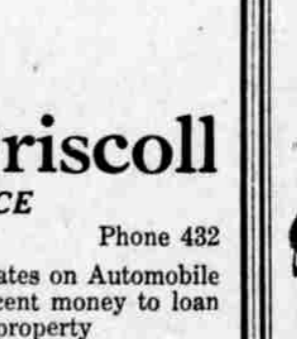
