creamy shirted youth disappear through an open window.

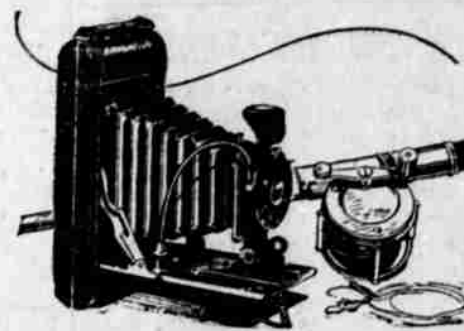
## CITY OFFICIAL DIES SUDDENLY
