

CUT-OFF DERBY WILL BE HELD JULY SEVENTH

Prizes of \$750, \$500 and \$250 Will be Given to Winners.

On July 7th the first annual air derby managed by the Yellowstone Cut-Off Airways association will be flown from Redding, Cal., to Boise, Idaho, following the route of the Yellowstone Cut-Off highway with stops made at Alturas, Cal., Lakeview and Burns, Ore., Caldwell, Idaho and finishing at Boise, Idaho.

Competition will be restricted to planes of the OX5 type because the officers desire to demonstrate that the Redding-Boise route is practicable for the type of craft the public in general will use in years to come, rather than to stage a race with freak racing machines with speed the sole factor.

Safety in aviation is the keynote stressed in the instructions which have been sent out to the towns participating, and the local men in charge have been impressed with the necessity of carefully preparing the landing fields and making arrangements to handle the crowds which will gather to watch the planes land and take off again. Wind cones will be required on each field and finish lines must be marked. Flyers will be clocked onto each field as they zoom across the finish line for each leg of the race. From this time they will be given 20 minutes to land, refuel and take off for the next lap of their flight.

Financial Status of County Fair Revealed In Statement Issued By Board's Secretary

In the forward of premium list pamphlet a brief concerning the financial condition of the county fair was made by Leda Parker, secretary of the board:

In presenting the Premium list for the 1929 Klamath County Fair and Products Show, the Board feels that it would be of interest to the patrons of the Fair and taxpayers of the County to know something of the financial condition of the Fair. The present fair site was purchased in the year 1923, the purchase price being raised by a special tax levy of approximately \$19,000. Since that time an additional levy has been made raising \$22,000 for buildings, a total of \$41,000 by direct tax. The estimated value of the land at the present time is \$40,000 and the buildings and equipment are valued at \$47,250, a total of \$87,250. The Klamath County Fair is one of Oregon's outstanding fairs. While the Board has felt that more money could have been used to advantage for premiums it has been impossible to extend along this line owing to the lack of funds. The legislative appropriation for the years 1927-28 also for the year 1929, has been voted by the Governor of the State.

"At the present time and for the past several years, the Board has held the Fair and conducted the construction program on practically a cash basis. A heating and ventilating plant has recently been installed in the main exhibit building, making the building comfortable in summer as well as winter. This year the Fair will be held in conjunction with the Central Labor Council combining their Annual Labor Day Celebration with the Fair. The program offered will be the largest and most varied ever offered at Klamath County Fair. Four days of wholesome amusement with a historical fireworks spectacle each evening. The exhibits promise to surpass all previous agricultural and industrial exhibitions held within the county. The present plans call for the placing of a collection of Klamath's best exhibits at the Pacific International in Portland, also an exhibit of potatoes and other products at some place in California.
