

O'GRADY BEATS K. O. WHITE IN 10 ROUND BOUT

Hard Hitting Ashland Youth Upsets Dope; Wins Bout.

Gene O'Grady, Ashland farmer boy, was given his big opportunity last night and made good. He administered a sound wallop to K. O. White, Chicago middleweight, in the 10-round event of a legion fight card and thereby amazed his most ardent supporters.

Knocked down in the first and dazed in the second by a battering attack to head and body, Gene snapped out of it in the third and carried the fight to the negro for the rest of the bout. It wasn't a "home-town" decision; O'Grady won the fight decisively although it was a scrap all the way.

The Ashland youth who has yet to lose a fight, couldn't be slowed up. Damaging blows to the body and head seemed only to incite him to harder fighting. He took the third, fourth and fifth rounds but lost the sixth when the black boy staged a stirring rally throwing punches from all angles.

In the seventh, eighth, ninth and tenth, O'Grady continued his battering attack, plunging in with lefts and rights and connecting frequently on the button. White who has the toughest chin seen in a Klamath ring in many a day, appeared to deliberately take hard smashes to the chin in order to sink hard blows to the body or slip over a right cross to the head.

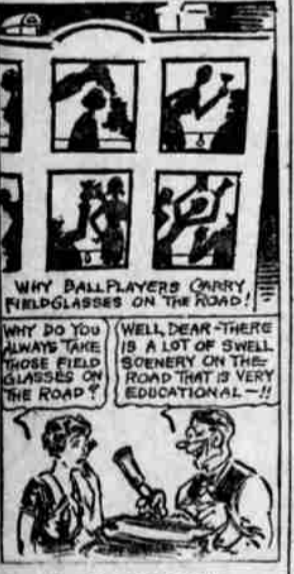
That O'Grady has a future in the ring was again revealed when he solved White's destructive body attack after the second round and saved himself from certain defeat. Gene simply stepped inside of White's blows or kept his elbows and arms in a position to protect the midriff. It was one of the best fights ever seen in a Klamath ring and a packed house howled its appreciation throughout.

In a bloody 6-round semi-wind-up, Frankie Monroe was given the decision over Jack Nash. It should have been a draw, Frankie connected with Nash's nose in the third and from that time on the claret flowed freely. Johnny Snell won a decision over "Cyclone" Randall. Although knocked down and beaten all the way, Randall put up a game fight.

After a good start in the first round, Indian Luke Chewter ran into a haymaker and was knocked cold by Jim Robinson. Indian Bud Jerry and Al Straub fought a 4-round draw.

The Hollywood Stars, playing a listless game, won a 15 to 1 victory over the Sacramento Senators in the California capital. Oakland fans saw the Mission Reds, winners of the first half of the season, defeat their home team 7 to 3.

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DANIELS LOSES BY KNOCK-OUT TO YALE OKUN

LOS ANGELES, July 3. (AP)—The rapid rise of Dick Daniels, hard hitting Minneapolis heavyweight, was temporarily halted today as a result of the technical knockout scored last night by Yale Okun, New York scrapper. The fight was stopped following the fourth round, when an uppercut from the first of the eastern fighter opened such a gash in the lower lip of his opponent that the flow of blood could not be stopped and Daniels threw in the towel.

Daniels had held a slight edge over Okun during the four rounds. His right to the jaw and lefts to the stomach rocked Okun. A grown-up man breathes about 15 or 16 times in a minute; a woman perhaps 13. Children breath much more often.

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HENRI COCHET BEATS TILDEN BY BIG MARGIN

American Ace Able to Get Only Ten Games From French Star

WIMBLEDON, England, July 3. (AP)—Henri Cochet of France defeated Bill Tilden in straight sets today in the semi-finals of the British tennis championships. The little French marvel flattened his old rival from the United States in decisive fashion by scores of 6-4, 6-1, 7-5.

The victory was the most one-sided Cochet ever scored over Tilden. Cochet beat him in straight sets in the Davis cup challenge round of last year but on that occasion Tilden won 17 games as compared to the ten he was able to capture today.

Loses One Chance Big Bill never threatened after the first set when he lost what seemed a golden opportunity to win the opener by allowing Cochet to pull up 40-love against him and gain the game that sent him into the lead.

Tilden and Cochet fought a grim first set, games going to four all with service. Then Tilden missed a wonderful chance. He was leading Cochet at 40-love in the ninth game, but the Frenchman pulled level and won the game, going into the lead at 5-4.

Tilden started the next game with a double fault, the game went to Deuce and finally the Frenchman broke through the American's service and won the set.

King Alfonso of Spain arrived as the second set started. Cochet ran the score to 5-love before Tilden got his only game in the second set. And he captured that only after a long struggle for advantage point Henri then ran out the set.

EXPENSIVE PLANE

ATLANTA, July 2. (AP) —Hobby Jones announced here today that he planned to play in both the British open and British amateur championship next year. His next big tournament will be the National amateur at Del Monte, Cal. in September. Hobby's last appearance in the British open was two years ago when he successfully defended the championship he won in 1926. He also played in the 1921 tournament, but failed to win. He entered the British amateur twice in 1921 and 1922, but failed both times. This is the only major championship he has never won.
