MARSHALLVILLE, Ga., July 2. (AP)—A rattlesnake said to be more than six feet long figured in the service held at the Methodist church here Sunday by the Rev. M. T. Webb. Only the pastor was aware of the presence of the reptile.

SPANS THE WORLD

BUS LINE TO START IN CITY BY MID-JULY

Plans of F. A. Oulton, Holder of Franchise, Told City Council.

Effective the middle of July, bus service will be initiated in Klamath Falls by F. A. Oulton, recently awarded the bus franchise.

This was announced at the regular meeting of the city council Monday night when Mr. Oulton stated he had studied the situation thoroughly during the past several weeks.

While the service will be put into effect shortly, final passage of the ordinance will not be made until September third. The ordinance is for the granting of a franchise for use of street cars without tracks or rails using electricity, steam or gasoline power operating across the highways and avenues of Klamath Falls.

Provisions for the fares will be made at the meeting on September third.

Hourly service will be given to the new town of Fairhaven which adjoins Weyerhaeuser lumber mill and will also carry passengers to the mill. Thirty minute service will be initiated in the city daily and hourly service on Sunday.

Four routes have been outlined. The first will run from Main and Sixth to the city limits. The second will start at the intersection of Main and Sixth and will go to the eastern city limits. The third route is from Riverside avenue through Hillside and Hot Springs to Crescent avenue. The last route carries passengers from Main street to the Ship-pington district.

Two per cent of the gross receipts will be paid to the city, payable quarterly.

HOOVER HOPES FOR TAX SLASH

WASHINGTON, July 3. (AP)—President Hoover is hopeful that the treasury surplus at the end of the fiscal year just closed may lead to a reduction in federal taxes, but he still feels that there are many factors to be determined before a definite program can be formulated.

Before tax reduction can be effected, the president said today: The effect upon the treasury of legislation approved in the last 12 months must be determined, the extent to which routine expenditures can be reduced must be known, and prospective revenue must be more closely estimated.

By November 1, the president said, these things should be known. He did not say, however, whether he thought it possible to introduce tax revision legislation at the regular session of congress next winter.

WIFE FINDS HUSBAND WHO "STEPPED OUT"

BELLINGHAM, Wash., July 3. (UP)—Edward F. Melhart, missing cashier of the Whatcom treasurer department, located by his wife in Portland today, will return to face charges of embezzling more than \$20,000 in county tax receipts, according to Sheriff T. C. Fraser. Fraser said Melhart promised his wife to return.
