MORE INTEREST IN WOOL SAYS U. S. BULLETIN

Buying Still Irregular in West; Inquiries on Increase.

BOSTON, July 6, (AP)—The commercial bulletin said today: "There is interest, possibly more interest, in wool, although it is being taken out mostly in inquiry rather than in purchases this week, especially in consequence of the interference of the holiday and inventories. Prices are hardly changed for the week."

In the west, buying is irregular and chiefly conspicuous in Montana, New Mexico and Oregon, where prices are about on the level of a week ago. "London looks for five to ten per cent decline at the opening Tuesday. Foreign secondary markets are generally quiet. "The goods markets show no special signs of new business but topmakers and spinners report it possible to make continued good deliveries on old contracts at the new price levels. "Mohair is quiet but steady."

SERIOUS STORM VISITS EUROPE

LONDON, July 6, (AP)—Central Europe dug itself out today from debris of a series of storms which yesterday swept down from southeastern Germany and killed 28 persons, injuring hundreds in Czechoslovakia, Austria, Jugoslavia, Germany and Switzerland.

The storms, which at times reached hurricane intensity and exceeded 100 miles an hour velocity, did widespread damage, destroying growing crops in some

districts, tearing down telegraph and telephone wires, and interrupting railroad traffic.

VIENNA, July 6, (AP)—Reports from all sections of Austria today emphasized the damage done in yesterday's violent storms. A telegram from Linz says thirteen church steeples crashed in that district, with 100 houses badly damaged in Neufelden. Almost the entire hop crop was destroyed by the hail-storm.
