The eastern states, as has already been recorded, were not particularly anxious to adopt an aggressive foreign policy, since the Atlantic seaboard would naturally stand the brunt of an enemy attack, but the western states were interested in seeing the flag of the Union sweep through from sea to sea.

The discussion in Congress at this time revealed the fact that the possibility of a war as the result of determined and aggressive foreign policy was not considered unlikely.
