## Thoughts We've Been Thinking

Dentist Has Unique Suggestion to Make. Chicago Has Fortune in Gold Teeth. Great Northern Has Encouraging Annual Report to Make.

AT a recent convention a California dentist suggested that there should be a 19th amendment to the constitution of the United States prohibiting the eating of certain foods. The eminent dentist on record that good, tobacco and good candy didn't harm the teeth to any extent. He advocated a diet composed of foods which would stimulate the gums. The convention was told that Chicago residents alone was \$10,000,000 worth of gold filling in their mouths and that \$15,000,000 in gold teeth are buried yearly in the United States.

HERE is another way to dispose of your fortune:

A man died in Indiana not long ago who had very strong faith in the power of interest. He willed about \$1,000,000 to a number of public institutions in which he is interested but it will be a long time before they get the money because the sum actually set aside for the purpose was only \$50,000. He believes, though, that if the \$50,000 lies in trust for 200 years at compound interest that it will grow to \$100,000,000 and his bequest is based on that assumption. He directs that in the year 2129 the accumulated millions be distributed to the various beneficiaries.

The thought occurs, how can he be sure that the money will be earning compound interest for 200 years and that there will be no law suits. At 3 per cent interest compounded annually according to the banker's ritual, which is the interest table, money doubles itself in 23 to 45 hundredths years. But that would not make \$100,000,000 from \$50,000; so evidently 4 per cent is figured. As 4 per cent the \$50,000 would double itself in 17 and 67 hundredths years or about 11 and three fourths times in 200 years, totaling about \$175,000,000. It figures nicely on paper but it will be interesting to be here at 2129 and see how much it has amounted to and to see how this money is to be piled up as still in existence. We all have a very emphatic habit of making our plans and then they mature about 10 or 50 per cent of perfection. That may be the way with this fellow.

## AIRPLANE HOPS OFF FOR ROME

### NEW MARK SOUGHT BY AIR ACES

Roger Q. Williams Off on Long Flight Early This Morning.

### ROME DESTINATION OF DARING FLYERS

Last Heard From Plane Indicates Everything is Well Under Control; Take-off Effected After Run of One Mile Down Old Orchard Airway.

GLoucester, Mass., July 8. (AP)—Lieutenant L. M. Melka, pilot of the coast guard plane accompanying the Old Orchard-to-Rome airplane pathfinder, reported to coast guard base 7 here at 9:50 a. m. (eastern daylight) that he had last seen the plane about 75 miles off Portland Lightship and that she was "going fine." The coast guard plane then turned back.

OLD ORCHARD, Me., July 8. (AP)—The monoplane Pathfinder with Pilot Roger Q. Williams and Navigator Lewis A. Yancey aboard took off from the beach here with Rome as its destination at 8:49 A. M. E. D. T.

The fliers expected to make the 4,700 mile flight in from 45 to 40 hours.

The plane took the air after a run of about one mile and headed due south gaining an altitude of about 100 feet as it left the beach.

The ship then made a wide swing and headed east on her course until lost to sight in the haze.

Escorted By 3 Planes  
Three planes accompanied the Rome-bound plane. The coast guard Amphibian was on the left, a small commercial plane on the right and a large commercial Amphibian close in the rear. Aboard the Amphibian were a dozen persons, including Thea Rasche, German aviatrix.

The Pathfinder seemed to be just able to hold the 100 foot altitude as it passed out of sight. That was the ceiling of the machine as computed by Williams.

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### HOMICIDE ADMITTED BY SPOUSE

TOULON, Ill., July 8. (AP)—Laura Weaver, a 21 year old woman of great size and strength, was held today for the torch murder of her common law husband, Wilmer T. Kitzelman, 52.

Six feet tall and weighing 230 pounds, the young woman told of strangling Kitzelman, wrapping his body in a quilt, rolling it downstairs, loading it into an automobile and driving into the country where she dumped it by the roadside, poured kerosene over it and touched a match.

A brother identified the victim through a set of false teeth. After two hours of questioning the Weaver woman detailed for county officers the story of her affair with Kitzelman and its ending. Her confession told of her growing disgust with Kitzelman's habit of drinking to excess.

"He came to our room over the gambling house at Wyoming, Ill., Sunday morning, (June 30th)," the confession, as released by officers said. "He had been drinking. He grabbed a chair and tried to strike me with it. I got away from that. Then he tore a mirror from the wall and brought it down on my head."

### POLICY IS EXPLAINED BY WILBUR

Economic Soundness Will Determine Reclamation Development.

### TYPE OF RANCHERS OF BIG IMPORTANCE

"No Dirtier Trick in the World Than Settling a Farmer on Land Where There is no Chance for Him to Make a Living," Declares Secretary.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 8. (AP)—The future development of reclamation projects in the west by the interior department will depend on the economic soundness of the individual projects proposed.

Secretary Wilbur, on an inspection trip of interior department activities in the west declared here today that the department was making a complete economic survey of existing irrigation projects and that where "the economics of the situation are unsound stern remedial measures will be resorted to."

"Most reclamation projects depend largely on the kind of people who settle them," Dr. Wilbur said, "but in a number of cases we have placed good farmers on reclaimed land to compete in an open market with the result that they have practically starved to death."

"There is no dirtier trick in the world than settling a farmer on land where there is no chance for him to make a living," he declared. "No land should be reclaimed until it is certain that when it begins producing it will raise something that land watered by rains cannot raise."

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### AIRPLANE IS ALOFT 149 HOURS

CULVER CITY, Cal., July 8. (AP)—A bit more than a day and a night separated the biplane Angelino from a new endurance refueling record as it roared past the 149th hour of consecutive flight here at 12:29:30 p. m. today.

### SCHOOL WALL FALLS IN EAST WHITTIER

Two Producing Oil Wells in Santa Fe Springs District are Stopped by Severe Earthquake Felt in Southern California This Morning.

LOS ANGELES, July 8. (UP)—Four persons, two men and two children, were injured in an earthquake which severely shook Los Angeles and communities within a 30-mile radius at 8:45 a. m. today. These injuries were reported from Santa Fe Springs, oil town 15 miles south of here.

Damage to the extent of \$50,000 was reported in East Whittier, suburb of Los Angeles, from the earthquake. A section of one wall of the East Whittier school crumbled and the structure was thrown out of line. It was unoccupied, this being vacation period.

Two East Whittier homes were wrecked, and several damaged by falling chimneys. No personal injuries were reported from that section.

The city hall was constructed so that a sway of the tower three feet, or 18 inches in each direction, is provided for, engineers said. The 1,500-pound chandelier in the rotunda of the building swung on an arc of 12 inches during the tremor.

Elevator operators who were at the top of the buildings reported that the elevators shook and rattled so much that passengers were forced to hold to the sides for support.

Residents in the southwest section of the city said the earthquake was extremely severe.

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## N. A. STOCKWELL MEETS INSTANT DEATH SUNDAY

Milton Lotches, Aged Three, Sustains Fractured Skull; Others Less Seriously Hurt; Accident Occurs on Highway Near Algoma Last Night.

Tragedy stalked Klamath highways again, last night when N. A. Stockwell, 27, popular employe of a Piggly Wiggly store in Klamath Falls, met instant death in a head-on automobile crash on The Dalles-California highway one-half mile north of the Shady Pine barbecue stand and gas station.

Milton Lotches, aged 3, is in a serious condition suffering from a fractured skull. Alfred Isaacs, aged 11, is suffering from a serious scalp wound. Lena Lotches incurred a fractured arm. Mervin Isaacs, 9, and Modesto Jimenez sustained painful bruises.

The accident occurred at about 7 p. m. There were no witnesses but investigators reconstructing the story from accounts of persons surviving the crash and from other evidence on the highway said today that Stockwell's car was probably in the middle of the road instead of on the right hand side.

An added tragic element was the fact that Stockwell had planned to leave last night for Los Angeles to visit his mother whom he had not seen for six years. It was to be a surprise visit. He had eagerly anticipated her joy on seeing him after so many years.

Yesterday he had driven to Chiloquin to bid farewell to a friend, Miss Anna Evans, of the reservation town. He was returning to Klamath Falls when the accident occurred.

Strangely enough, the accident occurred on a straight-away. Stockwell was driving a small sedan south towards Klamath Falls. The other car, a large new sedan, was coming north towards Algoma. Lena Lotches, aged 19, was driving, Jimenez was in the front seat with her, and the Lotches boy and two Isaacs children were in the rear seat.

The left front fenders of each car hit head on. The Lotches machine was on the right hand side of the road and that Stockwell's machine was in the center, according to the statement of Jimenez.

Stockwell's machine went off the right hand side of the road rear end first. It was virtually demolished. The other car was knocked off the other side.

Chest injuries over the heart—probably sustained when the steering wheel caved in—killed Stockwell. He was thrown out of the car and the body was recovered a few feet off the highway. Fortunately a wrecking car from the Motor Inn happened to arrive a few minutes after the accident and took charge of the injured persons.

Three other forest fires which broke out in various parts of the county are under control. They include blazes east of Lorella, north of Bonanza and in the Pogeagamas.

Stockwell has resided in Klamath Falls for one month. He was single and lived at 629 Jefferson. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. E. S. Roderick of Los Angeles and a brother, Charles E. Stockwell who is on his way north today to take charge of the body.

The accident was investigated by Keith Ambrose, Klamath Falls chief of police, Traffic Officer Totten, and Deputy County Coroner Henry Joyaux.

The body is in the care of the Earl Whitlock Funeral Home. Funeral arrangements will await the arrival of his brother.

## EWAUNA MILL BLAZE PUT OUT

Fire originating in the fuel bin of the Ewauna Box company did slight damage last night before it was extinguished by the Klamath Falls fire department aided by the mill crew.

How the blaze started was not known, according to Claude H. Daggett, mill official this morning.

"However," he added, "such fires are nothing new. Fuel bin blazes are not of serious moment as they can usually be held in check."

There was no hint of incendiarism from mill officials.

Firemen found it necessary to rip off the roof of the structure to let out the smoke so the blaze could be effectively fought.
