## "HEART BALM" DAMAGE ACTION IS WITH JURY

CHICAGO, July 8. (AP)—The \$250,000 breach of promise suit brought against Franklin S. Hardinge, 62-year-old oil burner manufacturer, by Mrs. Ann Livingston of Tulsa, Okla., was given to the jury at 3:22 p. m. today. Ann Livingston was characterized as a "cold, calculating lady from Tulsa" by the defense today.

Of Hardinge, the chief attorney for Miss Livingston said: "With a lie on his lips and malice in his heart, he knew he was doing this girl wrong." Mrs. Livingston's attorneys asked that she be given punitive damages as well as compensation because, they contended, her character was blackened by the testimony of Mrs. Victor C. Heath of Omaha, who said the plaintiff was indiscreet with me as a girl in Little Rock, Ark.
