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PINE HOLDERS FIGHT AGAINST BIG TAX RAISE

Weyerhaeuser, Long Bell and Pickering Interests are Protestants.

ALTURAS, Cal., July 8.—Large timber owners of Modoc county have protested against raises in taxes on timber lands assessed against them this year, and formal objections were filed with the county board of equalization in session here recently.

The principal objection which is being made by the various companies interested is to an assessment of \$2.50 per acre on timber land in addition to the assessment on timber standing on the land.

Alex Hay, representing the Long-Bell Lumber company, Jack Kimball of Klamath Falls, representative of the Weyerhaeuser interests, E. G. Scammon of the Red River Lumber company of Westwood and C. S. Baldwin, attorney for the Pickering Lumber company, appeared before the board during the day in support of their objections.

Weyerhaeuser interests declare that their assessment has been raised more than \$125,000 by this move or a total of about 37 per cent increase in their assessed valuations.

The representative of the Long-Bell company stated that the assessment on their lands were far in excess of their value, that they could not lease them

for grazing purposes and that the value was unjust so far as the actual land values were concerned.

The Pickering company will contend that its increase approaches a 50 per cent raise as much of the best timber of the county had been taken up by other companies at the time they came into the county and that much of their land contains a light stand. It is understood that they will also show that the loss from "no beet" has averaged more than 19 per cent on their holdings while further affects the percentage of increase in their assessed valuations.

The board granted the owners further time in which to present their arguments and all facts in connection with the assessments, and it was indicated by both the board and the timber owners that they were anxious to reach a settlement of their problems of taxation by filing the company cruises with the tax officials in order that a definite basis of taxation would be arrived at as determined by the assessment.
