It smashed in a thousand pieces and almost stunned me.

"Finally I got me on the bed and sat watching him an hour. He got up, drank some more and fell back on the bed in a stupor.

"I took off his belt and punched more holes in it so I could draw it tighter. Then I pulled it around his neck until he got blue in the face. Then I hooked it.

"It was about 11:30 a. m., Sunday. Most of the folks in town were at church. I pulled the old patchwork quilt from under him and threw it over his head. It seemed a long time that he continued moving under the quilt. Finally he was still.

"I got some fish line and tied him up, bending him so his chin rested on his knees. I rolled him off the bed, and wrapped the quilt around him, like a bundle.

"I went down and drove the coupe up to the door. Then I went back. I didn't want to carry such a load down, so I rolled it down the stairs. At the foot of the stairs I picked him up and put him in the back of the coupe."

She told of driving out of town, of stopping to buy Naptha and of leaving the main road for a little frequented by-way. Then she continued:

"I took the bundle out and threw it beside the road in some weeds. I poured Naptha over it, threw the jar away, and touched a match. It was blazing hard when I drove away."

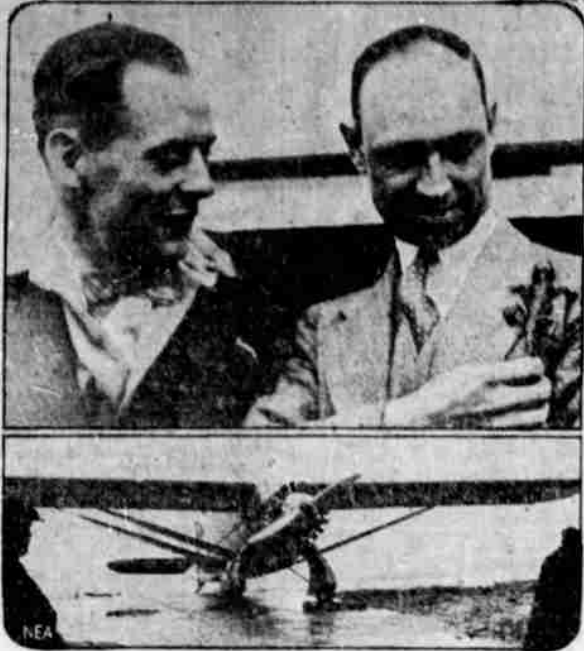
ducing oil wells in the eastern end of the field were stopped up by the tremor.

LOS ANGELES, July 8. (AP)—Communities within a 30-mile radius of Los Angeles reported a strong earthquake of several seconds duration beginning at 8:45 a. m., today. Long Beach, Hermosa Beach and Santa Monica, all on the Pacific ocean, felt the effect of the tremor more than the inland communities of Pasadena and Glendale.

The tremor was an undulating north and south movement, causing chandeliers in some buildings to sway several feet like pendulums, rattling windows and moving small objects but causing no damage. A second tremor of less intensity was felt an hour later at 9:45 o'clock.

ST. LOUIS, July 8. (AP)—The ninth earthquake in three days, and the most violent, was recorded yesterday by the St. Louis university seismograph. The distance was 4,660 miles, indicating, Father James B. MacElwane said, that the quake was in the vicinity of the Aleutian islands where four shocks occurred Friday and four Saturday. The disturbance began at 3:33 p. m., with the maximum at 3:56 p. m.

hams before the take off. The fliers planned, strike almost due east to the tip of Cape Cable, N. S., there they will head southeast to the "corner" the junction of Steamship lane, about 1,000 miles from Old Orchard.

Their course will then follow the 41st latitude, aporing 100 miles north of the Azores and reaching the mainland at Cape Ortegal, along the northern tip of Spain, they then plan to cross Bayonne, France and head across the Mediterranean, passing over the Island of Corsica.

Has Mariner's License. Yancey, who holds a master mariner's license and has been a navigator for 22 years, for the most part on ocean boats, said he had been asked by Dr. James H. Kimball, New York meteorologist and unofficial starter of all trans-Atlantic flights, to make readings to check certain theories.

He said he would take accurate temperature readings at hourly intervals especially in and near cloud formations.

"I am a working man and I am going out to do a day's work," Yancey said when newspapermen asked him for some statement just before the take off. Williams, as usual, would not comment.

The Pathfinder, a Bellanca monoplane, powered with a Wright motor, bears the insignia "XX 3789" in black on the tail and underneath the left wing. The wings and tail are painted with aluminum paint and the fuselage is a light green with the name "Pathfinder" on both sides.

Planes Circle. As the fog lifted for a moment spectators on the beach could also the Pathfinder and its two accompanying Amphibians circle, apparently in an effort to gain altitude.

Williams and Yancey were cheerful as they ate breakfast this morning. They laughed and chatted with Mrs. Yancey and Theda Rasche, German aviator.

Food for the flight was put aboard the Pathfinder. It consisted of one roast chicken, three quart bottles of coffee, three quarts of water, six chocolate bars, eight oranges, six apples and a bottle of liquor.

Recalling how a Portland youth stowed away on the Yellow Bird before it hopped for France on June 13, police made a careful inspection of the interior of the Pathfinder and then stayed close by the machine until its take-off.

A wind, with an estimated velocity of ten miles, sprang up from the south to aid the fliers in getting the heavily loaded plane off the sand.

Mrs. Yancey, worn by the many nights of little sleep preparing for the hop off, returned to her room at a hotel here immediately after the start and left orders she was not to be disturbed.

The fliers estimated the distance to Rome at 8,700 miles and hoped to reach there in from 45 to 50 hours.

MONTH OF JUNE DRY AND CLEAR

Little Rainfall Reported by Southern Pacific Weather Bureau.

The month of June was dry and clear. During the month only .23 of an inch of rain fell and there were 18 clear days, according to Southern Pacific weather bureau records.

Six days, however were entirely overcast, while another six were partly-cloudy. Maximum temperature for the month was 25 degrees, on June 2 and the maximum temperature was 92 on June 27.

In May the precipitation was only .05 of an inch; there were 25 clear days, two cloudy and three partly cloudy. The minimum of 26 degrees and the maximum 86 degrees.

June of 1928, however was damper, and warmer the records show forty and five hundredths of an inch fell, the maximum was 91 and the minimum 35.
